RICHMOND HILL, January 7, 1901

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is among those who feel that Canada was wronged by the decision of Lord Alverstone on the Alaska boundary. Shortly after the decision was given out the Canadian Premier expressed his dissatisfaction, and pointed out that Canada should have more to say in the making of treaties affecting her permanent interests. Sir Wilfrid follows up his former remarks, and says that in treaties affecting Canada all the representatives of Great Britain should be commissioners chosen from among Canadians, and that the negotiations should be conducted subject to the approval of the Canadian Government. It appears that the draft treaty would afterwards be approved or disapproved by the King through his British Ministers.

For our part we cannot see what better the new arrangement would be than the present. It would be little use to appoint Canadian commissioners in an international dispute if they could be disapproved of by the British Parliament, and it would be too much to expect England to run the risk of allowing Canada or any other colony to involve the mother country in war or serious dispute.

Victoria Square

The 50th anniversary of the Victoria Square Methodist Church was observed Friday and Sunday, Jan'y 1st and 3rd.
