Death of James Eckardt.

We have to record this week the death of Mr. James Eckardt of Unionville, who had been License Inspector of East York District for the past twenty years. Deceased had been ill for about two months, and passed away at his home on Monday of this week. Mr. Eckardt was born about the same place in which he died, and had spent his life in his native township. He was in his 67th year, and had long taken a deep interest in agricultural matters, and in anything tending to the good of the community. His father, Godlip Eckardt, was born in Markham township in 1798, the family having emigrated from Pennsylvania in 1792. Deceased was at the time of his death President of the East York Agricultural Society. He was a staunch Liberal in politics, was a member and generous supporter of the Lutheran Church, and also a member of Naomi Lodge, A. F. & A. M., Markham. He leaves a widow, five sons and four daughters to mourn his loss.

The funeral took place yesterday forenoon and was very largely attended, many old friends being present from a long distance. About fifty Freemasons marched in regalia from the house to the cemetery, about a mile and a quarter away, and again back to the house, showing the last tribute of respect to the departed and esteemed brother.

The pastor conducted a short service at the house, and after the usual ceremony at the grave, the Masonic funeral service was read by R. W. Bro. H. A. Nicholls, D. D. G. M., assisted by Rev. Bro. Lawrence, Church of England clergyman, at Stouffville. Service was afterwards held in the Lutheran Church, which was crowded, the service being taken by the pastor—Rev. Mr. Stouffer—and Rev. Mr. Duncan, Presbyterian clergyman. The sermon was impressive, and the mourners were not alone in dropping tears of sorrow as the pastor referred to the departed as a true friend, a kind husband, and a tender father.

East York Conservatives.

The annual meeting of East York Conservatives was held in Markham on Monday. There was a large attendance of enthusiastic representatives and the election of officers resulted as follows: President, Alfred Mason; Vice-Presidents, C. T. Lyon and H. A. Nicholls; Sec'y-Treas., A. W. Milne; W. F. McLean, M. P., and J. W. Moyes, Honorary Presidents.

Good speeches were made by J. W. Moyes, S. T. Humberstone, County Councillors Baird and Chester, H. A. Nicholls, Wm. Milliken and Mr. W. H. Pugsley. The address of Mr. Pugsley, Conservative candidate for Centre York, as reported in The World, is as follows: "I am running," he said, "as a protest against the infamous gerrymander of the County of York." He thought his opponent should have fought in the district where he resided, but of this he would leave the electors to judge. As a farmer in the riding for a large number of years, he hoped to secure the esteem of that important body. His record in municipal politics for 20 years was before the people, and he had nothing to conceal. He endorsed many of the planks of the conservative party, and objected to the way in which the G.T.P. deal had been rushed through. Concluding, he promised to give all sections of the riding his personal attention before the campaign commenced.
