STANDARD BEEF RING.

A meeting of the Standard Beef Ring of Richmond Hill was held at the Dominion House on Monday night. A full complement was present and great enthusiasm was manifested by all for the welfare of the Ring. The following officers were elected: President, James Baker; Sec'y-Treasurer, James McLean; Committee, Garnet Duncan and Wm. Robinson. Mr. Geo. Redditt, of the Richmond Hill Beef Ring, was present and explained the mode of procedure of that Ring relative to killing, division of beef, etc. The plans as laid down by Mr. Redditt were unanimously adopted by the new association. Speeches were made by the officers and various members pertaining to the benefits of such associations, all agreeing that this was one of the best organizations for the welfare of the farmers, and looking forward to the success of the Standard Beef Ring.

CARNIVAL TO-NIGHT.

A racing and hockey carnival will be held in the rink to-night. The final heat of the local championship race between the heat winners, Ludford, Pethick, Glover and Sanderson, will be skated. A challenge race for a handsome silver cup will also be run off. Barlow, Roe, Forrester, Callahan, Hewitt and Lang, of Toronto, have already accepted the challenge and will compete for this cup. IRON AND STEEL INDUSTRY.

The Scientific American has issued another special number, this time devoted to the iron and steel industry of the United States. Technically considered, the number is one of the best of the special issues which have so far been prepared by the Scientific American. Each article bears the stamp of absolute certainty of fact—a certainty gained by a personal examination of each of the plants described. Instead of giving a condensed account of a large number of less important works, the editors have wisely adopted the plan of selecting a certain number of large industrial establishments, and of giving them a very thorough description. Among the more notable articles of the issue may be mentioned those on armor plate and gun steel, structural shapes, tube making, chain making, steel and wire making, and rail making. The number is dressed in a handsome colored cover.

THE FEBRUARY DELINEATOR.

The February Delineator is a magazine of uncommon interest and value. Its stories, articles and pictures are excellent, and the review of the fashions, including a letter from Mrs. Osborn, thorough and enlightening. In fiction there is a mystical tale entitled "The Silver Boat," by Albert Bigelow Paine; a strong love story from the Pacific by Edna Proctor Clarke, "The Wooing of Tia"; and a delightful middle-age romance by L. M. Montgomery; also a chapter of the Evolution of a Club Woman, the much discussed serial by Agnes Surbridge. The home life of Calve, the most interesting personality among the favorites of the opera, is described in a remarkably illustrated article by Percy Mitchell. A serious paper on "The Cultivation of Ideals" by Lillie Hamilton French will be generally enjoyed, and collectors of antiques especially will be interested in "The Quest of Roxana," by Frances Roberts. Dr. Grace Peckham Murray's article on the care of the complexion meets an urgent need for just such a scientific treatise simply presented. There are entertaining pages for young people, including chapters of "The Little Garden Calendar" of Albert B. Paine, and Gabrielle E. Jackson's "Tommy Postoffice," and an interesting paper dealing with the manners and customs of the Red men, by Lina Beard. Board of Health

The Board of Health met in the Village Clerk's office on the 13th inst. Mr. Henry Miller signed the declaration of office. Moved by Mr. Miller, seconded by Mr. Teefy, that P. G. Savage, Esq., be chairman of the Board for the ensuing year.—Carried.
Dr. Lawrason, as Medical Health Officer of this Board, called the attention of the Board to the extensive spread of measles through homes in the village, and recommended that proceedings be taken to check further progress of the disease.

The minutes of last meeting of the Board were read and approved. Moved by Mr. Teefy, seconded by Mr. Miller, that the chairman of this Board is hereby requested to wait upon the chairman of the Board of Education and request him to accompany the chairman of this Board and call on the school teachers of our village schools with a view to taking such steps as may be necessary to prevent the further spread of measles, which are at present in many homes in the village.—Carried.
