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Markham Tp. Council
Council met at Unionville on Jan'y 11. Members elect all present, viz., Messrs. Summerfeldt, Morrison, Harper, Francis and Lapp. After each had subscribed to and taken the declaration of office and qualification, Reeve Summerfeldt took the chair.
Francis—Lapp—that a grant of \$10 be made to the Sick Children's Hospital and the hospital for consumptives.
Harper—Francis—that the reeve and Mr. Morrison be a committee to call for tenders for the township printing.
Francis—Lapp—that six copies of the Municipal World be ordered for the use of the council.
Francis—Morrison—that the council meet at 10 a. m. on the second Tuesday of each month.
Harper—Morrison—that the following taxes be refunded:

Francis—Morrison—that the mover, reeve, Mr. Lapp and the clerk be appointed a committee to prepare a by-law on commutation of statute labor.
Mr. Lapp introduced a by-law to appoint a commissioner for Yonge St., and to provide its maintenance. Six hundred dollars was appropriated as Markham's share for 1904. Mr. J. E. Francis was appointed commissioner at a salary of \$25.
Mr. Morrison introduced a by-law appointing F. H. Quantz assessor for the west half, and A. Forster assessor for the east half of the township. By the same by-law J. F. Davison and K. A. Stiver were appointed auditors.
Mr. Harper introduced a by-law appointing a Board of Health as follows: Jonathan Nigh, J. A. Mitchell, David James, A. Summerfeldt and C. H. Stiver. J. R. Campbell, sanitary inspector.
Council adjourned until Tuesday, Feb'y 9, at 10.30 a. m.

The members-elect were all present, except R. W. Phillips. After subscribing to the statutory declaration and qualification of office, proceeded to business.

Larkin—Armitage—that J. Watson be instructed to make 200 tile on or before July 1.
By-law to appoint auditors and assessors was passed. Auditors, Abram Carley and Luke Gibbons. Assessors, Malcolm McCallum and Zenas Black.
By-law to appoint a Local Board of Health.
By-law to fix time and place for holding meetings of council.
By-law to repeal By-Law No. 93, appointing solicitor for the township of King, received its several readings and passed.
Council adjourned to meet at Harris' Hotel, Schomberg, on Saturday, Feb. 20, at 10.30 a. m.

We have noticed that some of our young ladies have already taken advantage of the freedom allowed them during leap year.

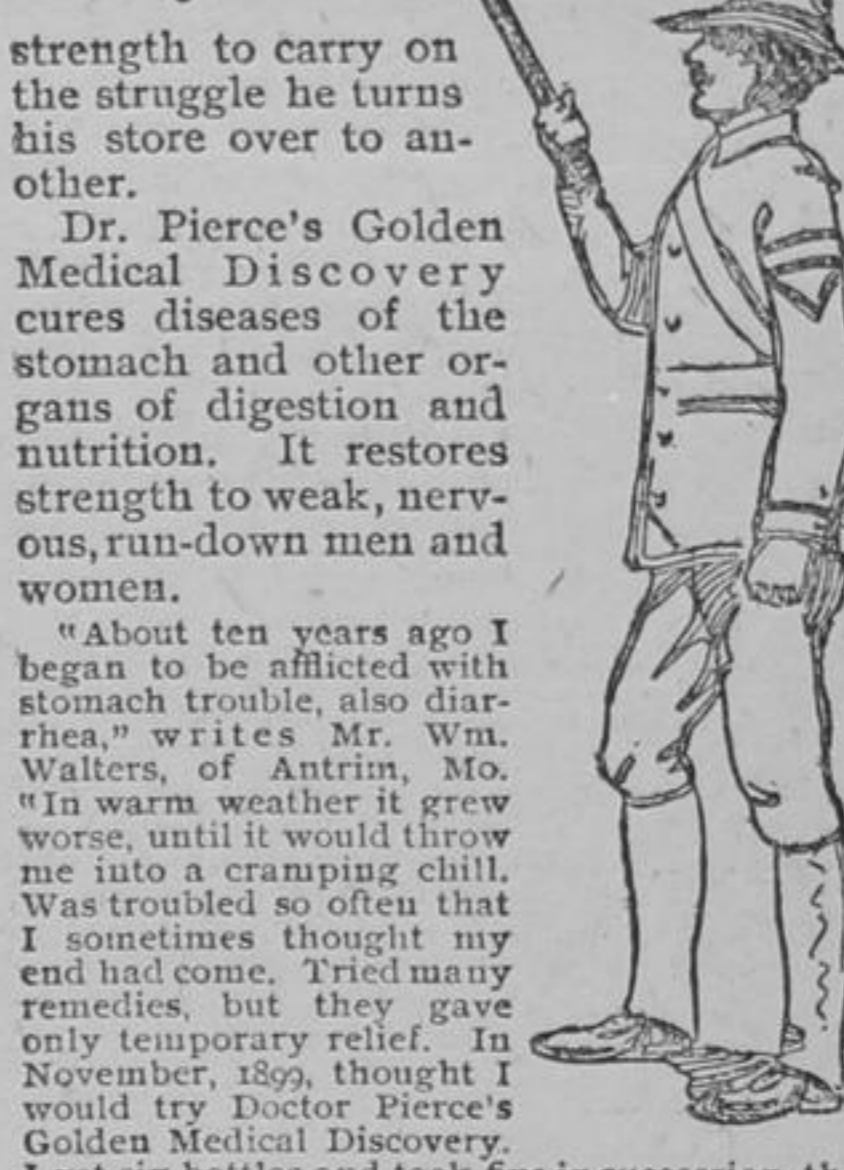
