The readers of the Canadian Maga-  
zine will find much excellent matter  
in the February number. Perhaps  
Professor Goldwin Smith's article,  
"Can Canada Make Her Own Treaties?"  
may not exactly please them,  
but his views are presented frankly  
and in an attractive form. F. C.  
Wade's "Comments on the Alaskan  
Boundary" is also attractive and prob-  
ably pleasing to some Canadians,  
though Lord Alverstone may not find  
it quite to his liking. The article on  
Sydney, Australia, with its excellent  
illustrations, is also somewhat un-  
usual. The short sketch of Mr. Heust,  
a man much spoken of as the successor  
of Mr. Bryan in the Democratic lead-  
ership in the United States and an  
avowed annexationist, is timely. S.  
T. Wood's epitome of Herbert Spencer's  
contribution to the world of ideas, is  
cleverly done. The second instalment  
of A. G. Bradley's "Fight for North  
America" is illustrated with portraits  
of Governors Shirley and Dinwiddie  
and autographs of some of the early  
French Governors, a facsimile of one  
of the plates which were nailed by  
Celoron on the trees from Lake Erie  
of the Mississippi, and some drawings  
to the French uniforms of the period.  
The short articles, the stories and the  
departments are all well done. Es-  
pecially interesting is Mr. Ewan's  
comprehensive monthly summary of  
"Current Events Abroad" and Mr.  
Cooper's comments on "People and  
Affairs."
