York County Council has been in session since Tuesday of last week. At Wednesday's session the following standing committees were struck:

Mr. J. C. Stokes, Keeper of the Industrial Home at Newmarket, asked for a grant of \$100 to obtain the services of a minister and an organist.

Messrs. J. T. Woodcock and J. D. Davidson were appointed auditors of criminal justice accounts, and the Warden and A. McCallum and J. Ley, commissioners of County Property.

Mr. D. Fotheringham, South York School Inspector, asked leave of absence to allow him to recover from his recent illness. The secretary-treasurer of the Toronto Junction School Board forwarded a communication asking for \$450, to which he claims the board are entitled under the statutes. The following grants to agricultural societies and farmers' and women's institutes were made:

King, Markham, Scarborough, East Gwillimbury, North Gwillimbury and Georgian, York Township and Weston, Etobicoke and Vaughan Agricultural Societies were each given \$25; Newmarket Horticultural Society, \$25; Richmond Hill Agricultural Society, \$25; East York Farmers' Institute, \$25; West York Farmers' Institute, \$25, and \$10 each to the Women's Institutes of East and West York. The District Agricultural Societies of East, West and North York were voted \$75 each.

Warden Hartman and Councillors Pugsley and Boag were appointed to the Exhibition Board.
