### WHEN TO SCRATCH WOOD.

Sound can be obtained without air if some elastic medium be interposed between the ear and the body that smits the sound, but sound cannot be transmitted through a perfect vacuum. Notes of Interest About Some Prominent People.

The King of Kano, in Central Africa, must be an uncomfortable monarch. Anyone who pays a call on him is obliged to take off not only shoes, but socks or stockings, and to approach His Majesty with head bowed to the ground.

Mr. Arthur Burrows, of Lincoln's Inn, England, is over ninety-one years of age, and is the oldest practising barrister in the kingdom. He attends to business at his chambers in Lincoln's Inn regularly, and is said to be able to do his work without the aid of glasses.

F. Marion Crawford, the prolific novelist, was introduced to a young woman recently. Hearing that he was a novelist, she said: "And have you written anything that will live after you're gone?" "I don't know," he replied. "You see, what I am after is something that will enable me to live while I am here."

Sir Henry Stanley, the famous African explorer, treasures a plated silver fork bearing the name of a fashionable London restaurant which he picked up in the heart of an African forest. It had been used as an ornament by the chief of a tribe of pigmies; though how it went so far away from the tracks of white men Sir Henry cannot even conjecture.

The Czar is not less careful of his life than his predecessors, but he adopts different methods for safeguarding himself. Instead of having three trains ready when he is going on a journey and leaving Anarchists to guess which train is conveying him, as his father did, he simply allows no one to become acquainted with his plans. The route is published, but he never keeps to it.

The Crown Princess of Denmark has the distinction of being the tallest and the wealthiest Princess in Europe. She inherited something like fifteen million dollars from her maternal grandfather, Prince Frederick of the Netherlands, as well as the bulk of the fortune of her father, King Charles of Sweden and Norway. She stands over six feet in height, and is an imposing figure.

Like the great Iron Chancellor whom he dismissed, the Emperor William is a great lover of dogs, though in both men love of animals is tempered by political reliance upon their utility as an intimate garde du corps. But whereas Bismarck cared only for the powerful breeds, which he styled "dogs of empire," the Kaiser's preference is for terriers, of which he always has four about him.

Mr. F. C. Selous, the mighty hunter of big game, who was at Tom Brown's old school—Rugby—was nicknamed "Zealous" by his companions. On leaving school he went to Switzerland to learn French and German. He rather startled the worthy Swissers on one occasion by jumping into the Rhine clad in top-boots and great-coat. A duck which he had shot had fallen into the river, and he wanted to get it out.

The Duke of Hamilton is thrice a Duke. He is Duke of Hamilton in Scotland, Duke of Brandon in England, and Duke of Chatterault in France; and thrice a Marquis—of Hamilton, of Douglas, and of Clydesdale. As an Earl he owns only two titles, those of Angus and Arran; but as a Baron he holds no fewer than seven—the Baronies of Avon, Polmont, Mackintosh, Inverdale, Abernethy, Jedburgh Forest, and Dutton.

The following story of the Pope is told in the Italian papers. A deputation of the monks of some order had obtained an interview with him. According to the etiquette of the Vatican, only cardinals are allowed to sit in the Pope's presence, and an invitation from him to do so is deemed equivalent to the promise of a cardinalate. Pope Pius X. is a plain man, utterly indifferent to the etiquette of the Papal Court. He therefore begged the monks to take their seats. They hardly knew whether they could venture to do so, and whilst they stood hesitating he said to them: "You do not, I suppose, expect me to draw your chairs forward for you?"

The late Sir John Blundell Maple was never tired of telling his friends how much he owed to his mother. He used to say, "She was the cleverest woman I ever knew," and he often related the advice she gave him when as a boy he thought of being called to the bar. "If ever you were to become Lord Chancellor," she said, "you would have reached the end of all things in that profession. You would have such and such an income and such and such a position, which are already known to you. But if you go into business there is no limit to your opportunities."
