THE WAR.

For months past people talked of the possibility of war between Russia and Japan, later came the probability, a week ago war was inevitable, and to-day the bloody conflict is a cruel reality. Japan at the very outset dealt her enemy a severe blow, but how and when and where it will end few will care to even guess. Shortly after negotiations were closed between the two countries the Japanese fleet attacked Port Arthur, the principal coaling station of the Russians, and destroyed three Russian battleships and two armored cruisers. Within a few hours after the commencement of the engagement their finest battleship was hopelessly crippled in the harbor and their forts were badly damaged. The damage to the Japanese ships was extremely light. The Japanese forces are naturally elated over their brilliant charge which is considered one of the most daring and successful in the history of modern warfare.
