WEDNESDAY'S WORLD.

The difficulties under which the Metropolitan Railway Company have thus far during the present winter operated their lines were intensified by the storm of Monday night. A strong wind blew all day, and, notwithstanding the fact that little snow fell, many of the deep cuttings which already exist, were speedily refilled. Four cars were stalled between Thornhill and Oak Ridges, and gangs of men, in spite of the severity of the weather, labored incessantly all night in an endeavor to clear the line. Frost bites were numerous, and to The World J. W. Moyes, the general manager, stated last night that the storm, in the intensity of the cold and the fierceness of the wind, was the worst that had occurred along Yonge street in twenty years. A feature which has served to render the difficulties of the Metropolitan Railway more pronounced is the inaction of the township and county authorities along the northern portion of Yonge street. During the greater part of the winter many miles of this highway have never been opened to traffic, the only avenue of travel being that furnished by the Railway Company. The county authorities have, with common consent, placed the onus of keeping the road in a passable condition on the shoulders of the Metropolitan Railway.
