The Reeve and the Clerk were instructed to sign a petition in favor of the Municipal Act that Councils should be elected every two years.

Sec. 7, part 4—Add, "All work done to be endorsed by the overseer."

Sec. 8 — "Commissioner" to be struck out.

Also insert after "30 cents an hour," the words, "except the months of Dec., Jan'y, Feb'y and March said months' pay to be 25 cents an hour."

By-Law No. 779 was passed granting and allowing the several salaries and allowances to be paid the officers in the municipality.

Devins—Cameron—that the auditors' report of the treasurer's accounts for the year 1903 be received and adopted, and that the clerk be instructed to have printed 150 copies of the same printed for distribution.—Carried.

Devins—Longhouse—that the treasurer be and is hereby authorized to pay the secretary of the Richmond Hill & Yonge St. Agricultural Society the sum of \$10.—Carried.
