**CORRUPTION ON BOTH SIDES.**

"All the vice is not in one party nor all the virtue in the other. It is not either party as a whole that is corrupt, but certain individuals within it who manipulate the wires and pull the strings that are bringing discredit upon the management of public affairs. When the people put purity ahead of party and fight corruption wherever it exists, then we will have more honest men at the head of our governments and purer administration."

Those who have been reading the Newmarket-Express Herald the past year or two will scarcely believe that the above admission was made in that paper last week, unless they see it with their own eyes. Nevertheless it is true. We were inclined to think, ourselves, that our northern contem. believed that all good emanated from one political party, and all that is bad from the other, but we cheerfully acknowledge our error. If the leaders of both political parties can come to the same conclusion, and endeavor to stamp out corruption wherever they find it, the result will be a purer administration of affairs. The trouble is in seeking corruption and crooked work only among one's political opponents, and closing the eyes to any faults of political friends.

This is the 17th of March, St. Patrick's Day, the day that Irishmen the world over delight in celebrating. The birthplace of Ireland's patron saint may always remain an unsettled question, but one thing is certain his name is honored on both hemispheres, and the Shamrock will be worn to-day in America as much as in any part of Ireland. The Irishmen of Canada are happy and contented, and no people in the world will wear to-day a sprig of Ireland's emblem with greater pride than the Irish Canadians. May they always live in freedom and friendship under the folds of the Union Jack.

The Dominion Parliament opened last Thursday with the usual pomp and ceremony. After a Speaker had been selected an adjournment was made, and the next day the Speech from the Throne was read. The bill of fare was not lengthy. As might have been expected thanks were given to Providence for the abundant harvest of the past year, and the general prosperity of the country. A militia bill was promised the present session; authority of Parliament is to be asked to increase the force of the North-West Mounted Police; and a copy of the Alaska Award is to be laid before the House. Probably the most important item in the speech was the building of the new transcontinental railway for which a change in the agreement is asked by the company.

Ald. F. S. Spence had a lengthy article in Saturday's Globe in which he calls upon the Liberal members of the Legislature to support their leader in a temperance measure said to have been proposed in caucus by Premier Ross. It is supposed that the bill referred to provides for the abolition of the bar and the treating system, and puts the remaining liquor traffic under Government control. Mr. Spence also points out that the proposed bill was opposed by a number of members who usually support the Liberal Premier. The writer shows that in both the plebiscite and the referendum large majorities were polled in favor of temperance. Mr.

Spence refers to the pledge made years ago by the late Sir Oliver Mowat, and hints that Hon. G. W. Ross and his party can better afford to suffer defeat than adhere to the liquor laws as they now stand in Ontario.

It has been said that years ago an Englishman and a Scotchman were disputing as to the exact date on which St. Patrick was born. The former contended that the correct date was the 8th of March, while the latter declared with equal warmth that the Patron Saint was born on the 9th of that month. To settle the dispute they appealed to an Irishman, who immediately added the two dates together, and ever since then the day celebrated has been the 17th.
