WINNIPEG ILLUSTRATED.

The engravings are very fine, and show many magnificent public buildings such as the City Hall, many large banking institutions, public schools, St. John's College, Manitoba University, the Law Courts, Post Office, etc. Several beautiful views are given of Assiniboine Park, private residences, etc., and of course the volume would not be complete without an illustration of Old Fort Garry Gate. Regarding the increase in population since 1870 the figures given from official records are as follows: "In 1870 the population was 215; in 1874 it had risen to 1869, in 1885 to 19,574, in 1898 to 39,334, on the 1st of October, 1902 it was 56,603, and to-day it is 77,000 souls."
