Much Painting this Spring.

Paint Should be Bought and Painters Engaged Early.

Preparations are being made that indicate extensive improvements to town property this spring. The paint dealers and the painters are looking forward to a busy season.

A prominent paint dealer, who carries the products of one of the largest paint and varnish manufacturers in the country, stated yesterday that never before had he had so many inquiries regarding paint at this time of year, nor had he ever known so many property owners to be contemplating painting. He was confident that the coming season would be a big one and he had put in an especially large stock to take care of his trade.

Other dealers and painters in town have had practically the same experience.

It is notable that both paint dealers and painters strongly advocate the importance of property owners figuring on their painting early, before the regular painting season opens. The reasons put forth are sound.

Early preparation, the deciding on the kind of paints, the colors to be used, engaging a practical painter, insures getting the work done on time, and having the benefit of the improved appearance of your house from the beginning of the season.

The combinations of colors used on a house are of considerable moment and should not be decided upon hurriedly. A single trimming not in harmony will often make a house an aggravation. Several paint manufacturers, appreciating the value of this feature, have an organized department of artists and architects whose sole duty is to specify good color combinations. Local dealers report that it is a common practice for paint buyers to give them a photo or drawing of their houses to submit to paint makers for color specifications.

Another point in connection with selecting colors is that an early decision will enable the dealer to order any special colors he may not regularly carry in stock.

There is economy, too, in engaging a painter before the season rush is on. When the season is in full swing and the painter has many jobs ahead, it is often a matter of speculation when your work can be taken care of. Painting should be done early in the spring, as soon as the moisture is out of the lumber and the weather settled. The careful householder has all the work arranged many weeks ahead.

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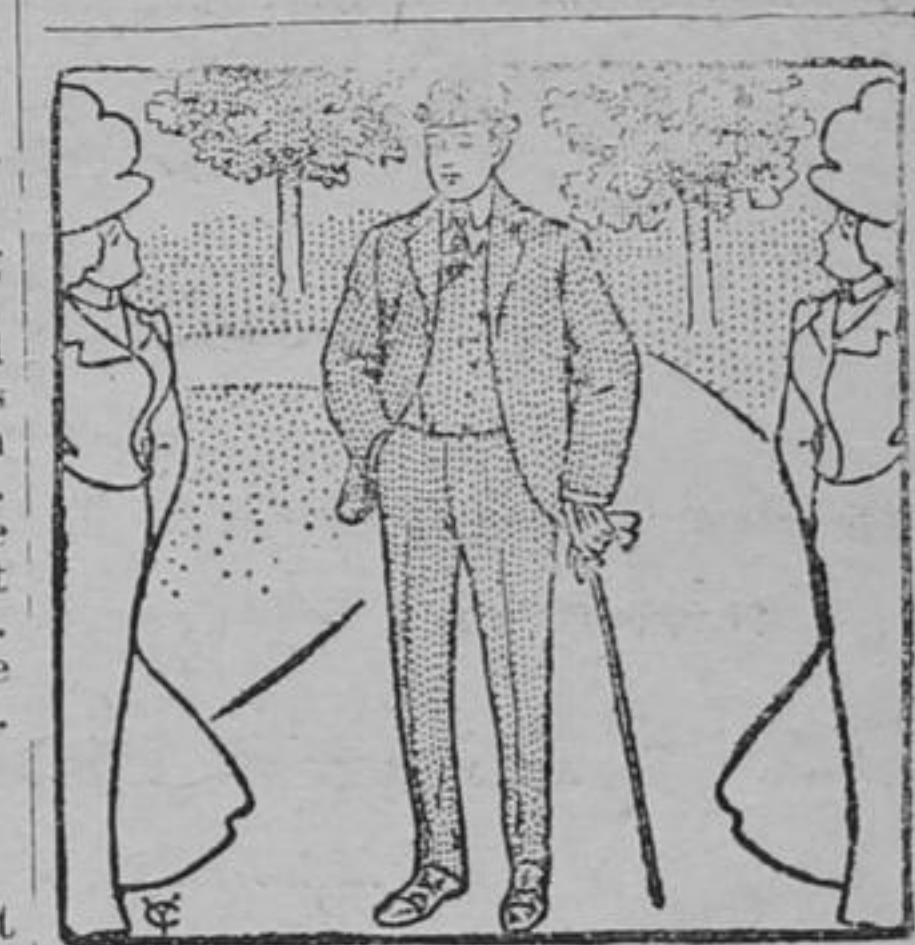
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
