On motion of R. W. Phillips, Council adjourned to meet at Trent's Hotel, Nobleton, April 30.

A Historic Squadron.

Tuesday, night March 30, 1904, at the weekly parade of the Governor General's Body Guard, Major Merritt issued an order which will be received with satisfaction by the people of the northern part of the County of York. The order was that "C" Squadron ("Oak Ridges") will recruit North of Toronto as formerly.

This Squadron is the old McLeod or (Oak Ridges) Troop, which the late Colonel McLeod commanded for so many years. This Troop, the Button Troop (Markham), now "D" Squadron, and the Denison troop, now "A" Squadron, are among the oldest Cavalry organizations in Canada.

Transfers were made in Orders by which Capt. M. C. Cameron takes temporary command of "B" Squadron, and Capt. D. I. Warren of "C" Squadron. The N. C. O's of "B" Squadron will now be Squadron Sergeant Major J. R. Honeycomb, Squadron Quarter Master Sergeant Geo. Smith, Sergeants A. D. Wheeler, G. B. Warren, C. Hall and W. C. Whitney. Corporals—Lance Sergeants J. D. Oates, J. Wilson, G. A. Thompson, W. J. Wheatley, and Corporals H. Bobeer, Cracknell, Schofield, MacKenzie, Wooley; with Corporals Martin and Vaughan on Supernumerary list.

"B" Squadron (commanded so long by Lt. Colonel Orlando Dunn) commences its new career a splendid overflowing Squadron; and "C" Squadron (Oak Ridges) will keep up its traditions and send a full Squadron into Camp made up of the best class of Yeoman from the North Country.

"A" Squadron, which the people of York and Toronto have known for nearly a hundred years, is rapidly filling up to its increased establishment with the best class of lads in the City. Other changes were, Lt. C. L. Wallace of Woodbridge and Corporal Chas. Fry are transferred from "D" to "C" Squadron and Lt. J. Creelman from "C" to "B" Squadron.

The recruit class will continue every Tuesday and Friday evenings under Sergeant Livingston.

The large N. C. O's class finished its examination Tuesday night.

Distribution of Choice Seed.

The members of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union are pleased to state that for 1904 they are prepared to distribute into every Township of Ontario material for experiments with fodder crops, roots, grains, grasses, clovers and fertilizers. Upwards of 1,500 varieties of farm crops have been tested in the Experimental Department of the Ontario Agricultural College Guelph, for at least five years in succession. These consist of nearly all the Canadian sorts and several hundred new varieties, some of which have done exceedingly well in the carefully conducted experiments at the College and are now being distributed free of charge for cooperative experiments throughout Ontario. The size of each plot in each of the first twenty-six experiments is to be two rods long by one rod wide; in Nos. 27, 28 and 29, one rod square; and in No. 30, four rods square (one-tenth of an acre).

Each person in Ontario who wishes to join in the work may choose any ONE of the experiments for 1904, and apply for the same. The material will be furnished in the order in which the applications are received until the supply is exhausted. It might be well for each applicant to make a second choice, for fear the first could not be granted. All material will be furnished entirely free of charge to each applicant, and the produce of the plots will, of course, become the property of the person who conducts the experiment.
