Many of the artists were deserving of special mention, but space will not permit, suffice it to say that the whole performance was an entire success, and reflected much credit on those who took part. Miss Ethel Switzer gave two soprano solos; Miss Mary Trench a solo and a reading; Miss Ida Glass, two soprano solos; Mr. E. Mason, a baritone solo, and a cornet solo; Mrs. Vivian, a soprano solo; Mr. J. W. Osborne, two vocal solos, the latter in character; Mr. T. A. Lamont, a reading. Particularly interesting features of the entertainment were a Flag Drill given by twelve girls and a Patriotic Selection by a large number of boys and girls trained by Miss Wiley and Miss Switzer. The twelve girls were prettily costumed in white dresses, red Eton jackets and red caps, and each carried small Union Jacks which they used in a creditable manner. After some very pretty turns and marches they sang "We'll fight for the Dear Old Flag," to the delight of the audience. In the patriotic selection Miss Olive Switzer, in a long robe, represented "Britannia," and representatives from India, Australia, England, Ireland, Scotland and many other countries brought in their respective products, and in neat little speeches laid them at her feet. At the close of this piece Mr. E. Mason in fine voice sang "Song for all the Britons," all the representatives joining in the chorus. The accompanists during the evening were Mrs. Hume, Miss M. Trench, Miss Barker and Mr. E. Newton, and the excellent Mason & Risch piano, furnished by Mr. Pethick, the Company's representative here, gave the players a good opportunity to play with delightful precision, and this part of the program was also thoroughly enjoyed. Between the two parts of the program a spirited sale of old magazines was held, Mr. H. A. Nicholls acquitting himself as auctioneer with distinction. Mr. P. G. Savage as chairman explained at the opening the object of the entertainment, which was to provide funds for the Library, and before the close, thanked all the performers for their kindness in furnishing such an attractive program. The receipts after deducting expenses amounted to \$23.00. For the decoration of the stage the committee are much indebted to Mr. J. H. Sanderson.
