**The Liberal.**

RICHMOND HILL, April 23, 1904

Another session of the Ontario Legislature has closed, and a number of important measures have become law. Those who prophesied that there was dissention in the Liberal ranks were mistaken as the well-known majority of three was maintained to the end.

A cheque for \$71.74 has been received from the Treasury Department for the Public Library. This is just half what the Library should have expected had the grant been paid dollar for dollar for books and magazines purchased last year. Mr. Whitney might have scored the Government for the latter's interpretation of "dollar for dollar," but he did not do it. Many of the Public Libraries will close if they are not more generously treated.

Although the Provincial Secretary ordered that no liquor licenses would be granted in Toronto Junction the coming license year, all the hotel-keepers in that town have made the usual applications. The hotel-keepers claim that there was an irregularity in the second reading of the local option by-law, and they purpose bringing the matter before the courts.

The Ontario Government has made a wise choice in the appointment of Mr. J. W. Gordon of Brighton, as the new Provincial License Inspector to succeed the late J. K. Stewart. Mr. Gordon is a barrister and he has long been known as an earnest advocate of the temperance cause. The appointment will be regarded by those who favor the full enforcement of the license law as a wise selection.
