RECRUITS WANTED.

On Saturday last Reg. Sar. Maj. Hodgins, Corp. Vaughan and Col. Sgt. Falconbridge of the Queen's Own Rifles were in the village looking up recruits for the Gov. Gen. Body Guard. It is proposed to revive the old Oak Ridges troop, and to go on duty at Niagara on the 14th of June for 12 days. An officer or instructor will be sent out here later to complete the organization. It is to be hoped a strong troop will be raised in York county. No sensible person will long for war, but if our land should ever be invaded by a foreign foe it is well to be prepared. It was suggested that the committee procure another net, a number of tennis balls, and have netting stretched along each end of the courts as back-stops.

PROPOSED GAS CO.

Reeve Savage presided last evening at a meeting of the Village Council to consider the advisability of establishing a Town Gas Plant for the purpose of lighting the village with gas. A number of rate-payers were present, and Mr. E. D. Morris of the Permanent Light Co., Toronto, submitted a proposition to erect a suitable building, and install an acetylene gas plant. This would cost \$5,000. A company would be formed, and the council or private individuals would be required to take stock to the amount of \$1,000. The company would also ask a franchise of 25 years. Mr. Morris said the company would expect a guarantee of about 29 lamps on the streets, as well as the lighting of about 25 or 30 houses or stores. He will submit his proposition in writing when the Council and ratepayers will be in a better position to discuss it. Mr. Morris asks that the Council will grant his company a year's franchise after plans are submitted, during which time the work must be completed.
