THE SPRING FAIR.

Large colored posters are out announcing the Annual Spring Fair of the R. H. & Y. S. Agricultural Society, to be held here on Victoria Day, Tuesday, the 24th of May. Awards to the amount of nearly \$1,000 will be given for horses, cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, dairy produce, grain, ladies' work etc., and a purse of \$100 is offered for an open trot or pace. A good programme of athletic sports will be carried out, commencing with a football tournament at 11 o'clock, for a cash prize of \$16.50. The East York Citizens' Band of Markham Village has been engaged for the afternoon. In the evening a musical and literary entertainment will be given in the Agricultural Hall, for which some of Toronto's best talent has been secured. Arrangements have been made with the Metropolitan Railway Company for a 40 cent return fare from Toronto and Newmarket. Cars will leave for the north and south immediately after the concert in the evening.

R. B. McCLEARY DEAD.

Mr. R. B. McCleary, for many years a resident of this place, died Saturday morning, aged 73 years. The end came suddenly though he had been in poor health for the past year or two. Deceased had been a soldier in the British army, and served at Gibraltar and other places. He was of a patriotic spirit, and never failed to discharge his old musket on the late Queen's birthday, Dominion Day, and other occasions. He was interred in the village cemetery Sunday afternoon, previous to which a service was conducted at his late residence by Rev. J. A. Grant. Mr. Grant spoke of his kindness of heart, his loyalty to the church, and his faith in God. Deceased leaves a wife who has done her best in attending to the needs of her husband during his protracted illness.

PROPOSED GAS COMPANY.

Mr. E. D. Morris, of the Permanent Light Company, Toronto, has handed to the Reeve and Village Council a written statement showing upon what terms he and his Company are prepared to furnish acetylene gas for street lighting, for the lighting of stores and private residences, and for heat and power in the village of Richmond Hill. Mr. Morris proposes to form a Company with a capital of \$5,000, and he asks a guarantee that \$1,000 of stock be bought by the village Council, or by private parties here. He also asks a guarantee that the street lighting will be given his Company at \$12 per light per annum. As we now have 19 street lamps this would mean \$228 per annum. For private residences Mr. Morris will guarantee that the cost shall not be more than \$2 per 100 feet of acetylene gas, and if the Company decide to change the plant from acetylene to water or coal gas, then the cost to be \$2.25 per 1,000 feet. The Company would ask a franchise of 25 years, and the promoters would like a by-law passed at once giving them the sole right to establish the plant any time during the next 12 months. The village Clerk has written for information relative to a similar plant at North Bay. Let our citizens think over this matter.
