YOUNG MEN WANTED.

Rev. Prof. Wallace of Victoria College, who preached forceful sermons in the Methodist Church here last Sunday, referred to the regrettable fact that so few of our young men are offering themselves as candidates for the ministry. The sermons were preached on behalf of the educational institutions of the church, and the speaker took occasion to say that a fund was necessary from which students, preparing themselves for the ministry, could borrow until such time as they were able to return the money, without interest. The fund was necessary from the fact that few of the young men who went forth to preach the gospel belonged to families of wealth. The profession of a minister is an honorable one, yet we have only to look around us to see that the number offering themselves for this line of work is on the decline. Scores of bright young men from our High School have been educated as teachers, lawyers, doctors and men of business, but the number to enter the ministry is exceedingly small.

Why should this be? We would not like to think the decline is owing to indifference to religion. No doubt one of the causes is the inadequate income paid to young preachers, and the distant prospects of promotion. It is unfortunate that such obstacles should stand in the way of those who are imbued with an earnest desire to save souls. The call to the ministry should not be looked upon as a call to riches or to a life of ease, but such a call should appeal to the best that is in a young man. No other sphere can give him a better opportunity to be a man among men, and challenge the best in everything that is worthy of manhood. The life of an earnest christian minister is often a hard one, but he will have a wide field for every talent he possesses, and he will be in a position to help on many occasions through life the sorrows of the rich and poor alike. A bright and pious student is a credit to any community, and those who have a desire to preach the gospel should receive every encouragement.

CHURCH UNION.

One of the popular subjects for discussion these days is Church Union. It may be years before the proposed Union of the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational Churches is consummated, but the letters and addresses of many of the leaders in those congregations during the last few weeks show the necessity of such a union. Much correspondence in various newspapers has been carried on in a broadminded spirit, and the contributions to show that the above named churches have been gradually drawing closer together. It is true all three denominations differ somewhat in doctrine, but many little differences can easily be brushed aside if the great object of Christian churches is to persuade mankind to lead holier lives, to persevere in the work of helping fallen humanity. Particular doctrine is so little referred to now-a-days in the pulpit, and the preaching is so similar in Methodist and Presbyterian Churches, that, as a rule, it would be difficult for a stranger to know the denomination of the preacher to whom he is

listening. There will be heartburns and probably bad feeling in different congregations when the question comes up as to which church will be closed at some hamlet or cross-roads, but the union of the above named churches will only be a matter of time.

Sealed tenders, addressed to the Provincial Secretary, Parliament Buildings, Toronto, marked "Tenders for Coal," will be received up to noon on Monday, May 23rd, for the delivery of such quantities and qualities of coal in the sheds of the following Provincial institutions on or before the 15th of July next, viz.:—Toronto, London, Kingston, Hamilton, Mimico, Brockville, Cobourg, Orillia and Pennington Asylums; also the Central Prison, Mercer Reformatory, Deaf and Dumb Institute, Belleville, Blind Institute, Brantford.

Specifications of the qualities and quantities of coal required and forms of application may be obtained on application to the Department or from the Bursars of the respective institutions.

Tenderers are to specify the mine of origin and the quality of respective kinds of coal, and furnish evidence on delivery that the coal is of origin specified, fresh mined and up to the standard of trade grades.
