AN UP-TO-DATE-CLOCK.

The clock-making industry in America has advanced by leaps and bounds during the past quarter of a century. To produce precision, clocks that will actually measure time to the second, has for years occupied the time and brains of the most skilled mechanics. A good sample of the latest and closest rating regulator clocks can be seen in Mr. Jerry Smith's shop, manufactured by the Waltham Clock Co. This clock is worth \$400 and guaranteed to rate within two seconds per month, if placed where it receives very little jar. The pendulum is charged with mercury (to overcome variations, caused by changes in temperature) and receives its impulse by the force of gravity through two pullet arms, which are alternately raised from, and released against the pendulum every second. By using gravity to vibrate the pendulum, that power which has the least vibration is applied. The case is made of mahogany, and has plate-glass front sides and back. The purchase of such an expensive clock evidently shows the interest Mr. Smith takes in his business.
