THE LATE JOHN COULTER.

After an illness of about five months Mr. John Coulter, widely known and highly respected, passed away Monday evening in his 84th year. Deceased was a native of Newtonards, County Down, Ireland, and came to this country sixty-five years ago, settling for a time in Kingston, but afterwards came to Toronto. From Toronto he came to Richmond Hill where he resided for the past fifty years. For many years he carried on here a successful business as merchant tailor, retiring about ten years ago. Until quite recently Mr. Coulter never had a day's sickness, though the death of his wife about two years ago was a severe blow to him. He was a Presbyterian in religion, and never wavered in his support of the Conservative party. The funeral yesterday afternoon was largely attended, many friends being present from a distance. A short service was conducted at the house by the pastor, Rev. J. A. Grant, after which the remains were laid to rest by those of his wife in the village cemetery. The pall-bearers were his three sons, John D. Coulter, city traveller for George Milligan; Dr. R. M. Coulter, Deputy Postmaster-General, Ottawa; Alex. Coulter, Department of Inland Revenue, Toronto; and three sons-in-law, Arch. Campbell of this village and R. Walker and C. Savage, Toronto. Besides the three sons referred to above, other surviving members of the family are Miss M. A. Coulter at home; Mrs. James Law, of Dundas; Mrs. Campbell, Mrs. Walker and Mrs. Savage.

Typhoid fever has visited the home of Mr. George Charlton, west of Thornhill, and already three deaths have occurred within the past week or ten days.
