York County Council.
York County Council concluded its work of the June session late on Saturday. During the week it was decided to pay a bonus of 25 cents a day to every member of the G. G. B. G. who are residents of York County, outside of Toronto.
A by-law to allow a part of the village of Holland Landing to go back into the Township of E. Gwillimbury was referred back to find out whether the by-law if passed would be legal.
Mr. A. B. Davidson presented his report as P. S. I. and noted many improvements in the past few years.
At Saturday's meeting the Finance Committee reported in favor of having the account transferred from the Imperial Bank to the Sovereign Bank, on the ground that the Sovereign Bank had five branches in the county. The report was adopted by a vote of nine to eight. The report showed that \$26,644 is required for general purposes, which means a rate of one and one-tenth mills on the equalized assessment of the county. The sum of \$7,416 is needed for the Industrial Home. The following grants to high schools, recommended by the Education Committee, were adopted:—Weston, \$350; Markham, \$765; Richmond Hill, \$404; Newmarket, \$391; Aurora, \$350; East Toronto, \$412; Toronto Junction, \$675.
The report of the By-law Committee, which was accepted without amendment, prohibited racing or furious driving.

Division Court was held here on Saturday. His Honor, Judge Morgan, presiding. The cases called were as follows:

Lloyd vs. Patton and Feren—Transferred to Aurora court.
Wright Bros. vs. Wilson—Account \$53.50. Judgment for plaintiff in full.
Miller vs. Fox—Note, \$17.85. Judgment for plaintiff.
Hart vs. Bales—Suit for hay, \$10. Judgment for plaintiff.
Rombough vs. Wright—Balance of wages, \$15. Judgment for plaintiff for \$10.
Palmer vs. Moyes—Account, \$34.35, for livery and board bill. The defendant disputed the plaintiff's claim, and claimed that in any case the account should have been presented within one month from the day of the declaration of election. This case was transferred to be heard before the judge in his chambers, Toronto, to see whether defendant or J. Smith is liable.
Two other cases, Glass & Glass vs. Nicol & Nicol; and Nicol & Nicol vs. Glass & Glass were adjourned to be tried before the judge here on Monday, the 27th of June. The last two cases arose out of a dispute between tenants and landlords in which more than a dozen witnesses were summoned.

Over 600 excursionists, mostly women and children, were drowned or burned to death on a New York steamer.
The steamer Canada collided with a coaler early Sunday morning and sank in the St. Lawrence river. Four passengers and one of the crew were drowned.
