**Fire Brigade Matters.**

To the Editor of THE LIBERAL:  
DEAR SIR,—In reply to a communication or question as to the duties of the officers of the Fire Brigade asked by the citizens in your last edition in reference to the engine not being in a satisfactory condition for doing good work I am satisfied this question is not raised by the citizens through any ill-will or desire to in any way injure the reputation of the Fire Brigade or any of its officers, but for the public good. So I shall endeavor to explain the situation in the same way.  
I am truly sorry to have to admit the engine has not been doing satisfactory work for some time, owing, I fancy, very largely, to want of proper heating of the Fire Hall during the winter season. But that is not the fault of either the officers or men of the Brigade who have nothing whatever to say as to the repairing or caretaking of the Fire apparatus. That is wholly in the hands of the Village Council, and you know Sir, it is walking on dangerous ground for the Chief or any member of the brigade to offer advice as to the management, but what I am going to say I hope will be accepted by the Council in the friendly spirit in which it is written. The Brigade have no fault to find with the caretaker, who is a painstaking and capable official, but it is in our opinion impossible to keep the pumps in good repair and in working order except the frost is kept out of the fire hall during the long winter months. The expense would be nothing compared with the loss at one fire. Now Sir, I think you will agree with me as a ratepayer that we cannot afford to allow our "Fire fighting appliances" to be in any way out of repair, and I hope the Council will see their way clear to put and keep in good working order every part of the fire department.  
I am sorry to trouble you Sir with this somewhat lengthy explanation, but I did not think it hardly fair to blame the Chief or other Officers of the Brigade for something they had no power to mend or improve in any way.
