He was climbing into a mow to start pitching, pulling himself up by a brace of the barn frame-work, and was near the top of the barn, when the brace gave way, and he fell head first into the cylinder of the threshing machine, which was running at full speed. He was instantly killed, the cylinder lacerating the head and shoulders. Deceased had been out from Ireland a few years.
