UNFAIR METHODS.

During the few past weeks The Toronto World has contained a number of clever cartoons, principally directed against the Ross Government. No exception could be taken to many of the illustrations, cutting as they were in relation to members of the Ministry. Politicians generally expect to give and take severe cuts. In fact if they cannot endure thrusts they had better keep clear of politics altogether. There is reason in all things, however. The cartoonist in Tuesday's World overstepped the mark. He pictures Ontario as a man chained by both hands to the rock "Sullivan," a vulture representing "an unclean Government" tearing at his vitals, with the Lieut. Governor, "Hercules Mortimer Clark" coolly looking on, though having the power to use the royal prerogative and dismiss the ministers. It is unfair to cast insinuations upon the good name of our Lieut. Governor who is not in a position to make reply. It is true it has recently been shown in the courts that crooked methods were used in electing some of the Liberal members, but surely the opposition ought to be satisfied with the work of the judges. The Ross Government has now only one of a majority, but that is a poor reason to call upon the Lieut. Governor to dismiss them altogether.

ELECTION FORECASTS.

The Markham Economist last week referred to the approaching General elections, and to the certainty that the Laurier Government would go back with an increased majority. The Economist is hopeful of large majorities for the Liberal candidates in North York and Centre York, with good chances for South York. We agree with the Economist that the Laurier Government will be sustained, but we do not think it wise to count on large majorities in the County of York. Many an election is lost by over confidence. The Economist gives its opinion as to the result in Centre York as follows:—

"In Centre York there is no doubt that Mr. Campbell will have a large majority—somewhere about 500 or 700. Mr. Campbell is an exceptionally strong candidate, and personally popular, and with nearly twenty years' experience in parliament. He is chairman of one of the most important committees in the House, and his prospects for a position in the cabinet are more than bright. Mr. Pagsley, the Conservative candidate, is an estimable gentleman, with a long experience in the County Council and is also popular personally and will no doubt poll the Conservative vote. But the fact that if elected he will have to sit in the opposition when he can do no good will weaken his chances with the independent vote."

We have received a copy of Mr. Ernest Heaton's book, "The Trust Company Idea and its Development," and find in perusing it much useful as well as interesting information. The work contains a list of the Trust Companies in the United States, Canada, England and other countries, and there is much evidence to show that good work has been done wherever they have been established. It is often safer to put the winding up of a business estate into the hands of a reliable Trust Company than into the hands of some neighbor or friend.

The latter may mean well, but he may lack that business judgment and tact necessary in such important work. Mr. Heaton's volume is for sale by all booksellers.

Hon. E. J. Davis has been unseated in North York by Chancellor Boyd and Judge Teetzel. The election was voided by the act of one Robinson, in assisting in Mr. Davis' election as an agent after Robinson had been reported by the judges in North Grey for hiring a livery rig on the day of the election. No moral culpability was shown at the trial. Mr. Davis did not interpret the Act that the hiring of rigs to convey voters to the polls was a corrupt act, but it was held so in the meaning of the law.
