The Markham Sun last week gave a map of what it styled "Gerry-mandered Centre York." The Sun says that the new constituency has been "fearfully and wonderfully made," but the map does not bear out that argument. Rev. A. C. Miles of Creemore, addressed a meeting of the Bible Society last Thursday evening.

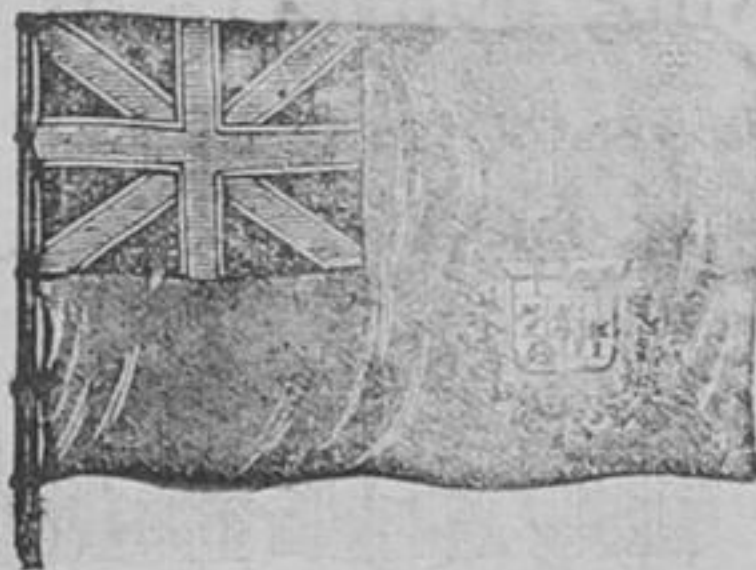
