**Ontario Fruit for the West.**

A prominent fruit grower in the Niagara district, Mr. Robert Thompson of St. Catharines, who has just returned from a trip through the fruit section of British Columbia, reports that though fruit growers and fruit growing is a new industry through British Columbia, the British Columbia growers can teach their Ontario competitors many valuable lessons, especially in the packing of apples. In this connection the fruit division of the Dominion department of Agricultural purposes are making a special exhibit at the November Fruit, Flower and Honey Show in Toronto, of the various varieties of British Columbia fruit packed by the growers themselves. Similarly the other provinces of Nova Scotia and Quebec will be represented. The matter is one of importance to Ontario fruit growers as they are meeting with keen competition in the western markets from British Columbia, and in the markets of Great Britain from the Nova Scotia fruit.
