Fattening Poultry for Christmas.

By W. R. GRAHAM, B. S. A. Well fleshed poultry of a superior grade is always in demand for the Christmas market and commands a price very much larger in proportion than does that of an inferior class.

Chickens intended for the Christmas market should be shut up in fattening crates or in a pen, from two to three weeks previous to the time they are to be killed. A seven foot crate will hold twelve chickens, or a stall eight by ten feet will hold twenty. Choose good healthy chickens of one of the general purpose or meat producing breeds, such as Plymouth Rocks, Wyandottes, Orpingtons, etc. A chicken weighing about four pounds feeds more economically than a larger bird, because it develops as it is fattening, although birds weighing five, six or seven pounds can be placed in good condition for killing in two weeks. Before being cooped the chickens should be dusted with insect

powder to kill the vermin. Feeding .- For the first twenty-four hours after the birds are cooped they should be fed very little, and throughout the first week light feeds at frequent intervals should be the raie. Heavy feeding during the first three or four days usually sickens the chickens and prevents them from do-Mr. Cook will be at Maple on Thursday ing well afterwards. During the second week the chickens should be given all they will eat twice a day, grit being supplied once or twice a week.
