REVIEW OF REVIEWS.

Several years ago, the daughter of the poet Longfellow paid a visit to the Ojibway Indians, on the north shore of Lake Huron, and for her benefit the Indians gave a presentation of their play "Hiawatha." Since that time the play has been given every summer near the village of Desbarats, on Georgian Bay, and those who have been privileged to see it are enthusiastic in their praise of the Ojibways' interpretation. The play and its accessories are fully described in the December number of the Review of Reviews by Mr. William C. A PLUCKY ACT.

Mr. Geo. Cowie, the north end blacksmith, did a plucky thing on Thursday by stopping a runaway team of horses. HIS FATAL FALL.

An unfortunate accident, which proved fatal, occurred at Elgin Mills on Monday of last week. Harry Wright, who had worked as hostler at the Dominion House until it changed hands a few weeks ago, and who afterwards went to Cosgrove's hotel, was assisting in putting in a cistern tank at Mr. M. Naughton's. When the tank dropped into the hole Harry evidently kept hold too long and fell in, striking his head against the bottom of the tank. He was rendered unconscious, and was removed to the hospital, but never rallied, paralysis having followed the injury. On Wednesday he was removed to the Toronto General Hospital, but died the following day. Deceased was an Englishman about 40 years of age, and was a member of the Sons of England Society at Eglinton. Poor Harry! the writer always found him kind and obliging, and it is painful to refer to his death, so sudden and untimely.
