Mr. F. S. ### THE HOSPITAL FOR SICK CHILDREN

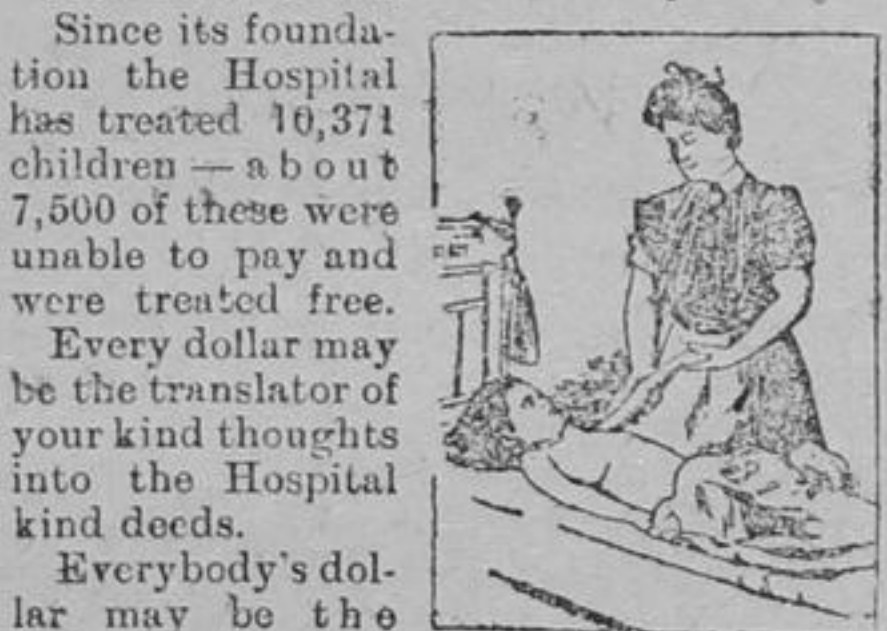
For it Cares for Every Sick Child in Ontario whose Parents Cannot Afford to Pay For Treatment.
