The Mail of Friday contained a letter from Rev. Edward Softly, rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, Morpeth. The clergyman refers to what he calls "dishonesty, lying and perjury" in the Liberal party led by Hon. G. W. Ross, and asks that they be turned out of power for the rascality shown in the courts. Politics will not be purified so long as Opposition newspapers and speakers pretend that all the sins are committed by the Liberals.

An enthusiastic convention of East York Liberals was held at East Toronto, Saturday, to nominate a candidate for the Provincial Parliament. Mr. Arthur Quantz, president, presided. The following were nominated: Levi Annis, James Ley, Wm. Douglas, C. R. Fitch, F. K. Reesor, W. H. Grant, J. B. Gould, A. F. Wilson and R. J. Gibson. All allowed their names to stand with the exception of Mr. Reesor, Mr. Gould and Mr. Wilson. After a sharp contest the choice fell to Levi Annis, whose nomination was made unanimous, and united support promised. Mr. Annis, though not in robust health, was pleased to accept the nomination, but, on the advice of his physician, he was compelled to tender to the Executive yesterday his resignation of the honor. The resignation was accepted, and a convention will be held at Markham next Wednesday at 10 a. m. Five delegates from each polling subdivision to be elected the previous evening.
