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East York Liberals.

East York Liberals met at Markham yesterday to nominate a candidate for the Local House, owing to the resignation of Mr. L. Annis on account of ill health. The President of the Association, Mr. Arthur Quantz, presided. Perfect unanimity prevailed, and every candidate proposed seemed anxious that the strongest man should be selected. After accepting Mr. Annis' resignation and passing a vote of sympathy to him in his illness, the following were placed in nomination: Mr. Summerhayes, Mr. Walter Scott, Mr. Douglas, Mr. Jas. Ley, Mr. R. J. Gibson, Mr. Lione, Mr. Fitch, Mr. J. Gould and Mr. Ross. After telling speeches Messrs. Summerhayes, Lione and Gould retired. On the fourth ballot Mr. Scott received a majority and his nomination was made unanimous on motion of Messrs. Douglas and Ley, the next two highest candidates. Mr. Scott accepted the nomination gracefully, thanked the delegates for the honor and expressed a hope that with the earnest support of his Liberal friends he could win the election on the 25th of January. Mr. Arch. Campbell was called upon and made a rousing speech on behalf of the candidate and the Ross Government. The meeting adjourned after the usual cheers were given.

Vaughan Nominations.

Nominations for reeve and councillors took place at Vellore on Monday, Mr. J. E. MacLean acting as returning officer. The hall was crowded and much interest was manifested in the proceedings. The following nominations were made:—

For Reeve, J. N. Boyle, proposed and seconded by A. Bryson and D. McDonald; Wm. Watson, by T. Keys seconded by Mr. Malloy.

For Councillors, D. C. Longhouse, by H. Rumble and E. F. Wallace; J. Scott McNair, by Mr. Bell and Mr. Stevenson; Jas. A. Cameron, by A. Bryson and T. Keys; Isaac Devins by Mr. Orth and Mr. Bryson; Jacob Williams by Mr. Whitmore and Mr. Fenwick; Wm. Thomas by Mr. Andrews and Mr. Kellam.

At the after meeting Mr. Bryson was elected chairman. Each of the nominees made short speeches, also the nominees for County Council, Messrs. Pugsley, Kirby and High.

Mr. Watson declined the nomination for the reeveship, and the Returning Officer declared Mr. Boyle elected by acclamation.

An election will be held on Monday for the councillors as above. The main question discussed was the commutation of the statute labor.
