Indian Pudding .- An ideal dessert to serve with roast pork is baked Indian pudding. This recipe will be found delicious. Take one pint of meal, in which a saltspoonful of salt, one-half teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-quarter of a whole nutmeg gratmixed add one pint of cold milk. Beat well, turn into a greased dish, water and bake three hours in a moderate oven. Serve hot with hard sauce. This pudding will look as if it had cream and eggs in it, and it should be stirred gently three times during the first hour and a half.

JAPAN'S RULE OF LIFE.

Curious Doctrine That is Held by the Japanese.

The Japanese army and navy will not strike Russia hard if the present trouble in her territory should develop into a revolution, for that would be against the traditional doctrines of "The Bushido," writes Hydesaburo Ohashi in Leslie's Weekly. "The Bushido" means "the moral doctrines of the Samurai' and they are obeyed by all the statesmen, soldiers and scholars of the present time with as much holy respect as the Christian's reverence for the Bible and its teachings. In Japan Buddhism is the popular religion, but Buddhist teachings are not respected by educated men or soldiers. In fact most of them are atheists or agnostics, who do not believe in any religion but the doctrines of "The Bushido." "The Bushido," for instance, teach-
