### THE LATE THOMAS FRISBY.

The funeral of the late Thomas Frisby took place from the residence near Victoria Square on Saturday last, and notwithstanding the almost impassable condition of the roads was largely attended. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. T. Campbell. Deceased was an Englishman, and came with his parents to Canada in 1831, settling near Richmond Hill, where his father purchased a farm in the 3rd concession of Markham, remaining there till the year 1851 when the father decided to go west, leaving his family in Markham. While on the way Mr. Frisby lost his wife on the Niagara boat, which was burned in September, 1856. The family thereupon decided to remain in Markham. Deceased was a staunch Conservative, and a member of the Methodist church. Mrs. Frisby, his late partner in life, preceded him to the grave about three months ago. Nine children survive.

### MR. MCCOWAN EXONERATED.

A meeting of the East York Conservative Association was held at Unionville Monday afternoon. At a former meeting of the Norway Conservative Association some dissent was manifested regarding the appointment of the License Commissioners in East York, but the meeting on Monday endorsed the selection made by Alex. McCowan, the local member. Sam Wilson, president of the Norway Association, declared that the appointment of L. A. Laplante as one of the members of the license board was unfair, as he was not a duly certified Conservative. Mr. Wilson contended that the appointment was made at the request of Robert Davies, the brewer. Mr. McCowan replied saying that in making the appointment he was actuated by a desire to secure good men for the position. That he was influenced by Robert Davies was absolutely untrue. At the meeting on Monday a resolution was carried demanding the dismissal of all civil servants appointed by the Ontario Government within the past two years. Mr. McCowan was deputed to present this resolution as a memorial to Premier Whitney and his cabinet.
