BONUS BY-LAW CARRIED.
 The vote on Friday last on the by-law to provide station grounds for the James Bay Railway was practically unanimous in favor of the by-law. Out of a total of 102 votes 97 were for, and only 5 against the bonus. Most of the lady voters in the village deposited their ballots, thus showing that they were imbued with the same spirit of progress and enterprise as the men. Mr. Teefy acted as returning officer, Mr. Furey was a scrutineer against the by-law, and Mr. J. H. Sanderson was a scrutineer in favor of the by-law. There were no rejected or spoiled ballots. Reeve Savage and his colleagues in the Council, as well as many other citizens, are to be commended for the energy they put forth in connection with this important matter. And now for the Railway and station.

IN HIS 82ND YEAR.
 Mr. Henry Phillips who had been one of our citizens for several years past, died at the home of his nephew, Mr. Albert Helmky, on Thursday last. Deceased was in his 82nd year, and had suffered for some time from heart trouble and dropsy. The funeral took place on Saturday. After a service at the house conducted by Rev. Thos. Campbell the remains were brought to Richmond Hill and placed in the vault, to be later interred in the Aurora cemetery. The pall-bearers were J. Comisky, G. Leek, C. Brodie, J. Barker, G. Monkman and A. Quantz. Among those from a distance who attended the funeral were Wesley Helmky, Cremore; W. Clubine, Toronto; W. R. Procter, Newmarket; J. E. Clubine, Oak Ridges.

NEW TELEPHONE LINE.
 Arrangements are about completed for starting a new telephone line in this section of country, the central office to be at Sanderson's drug store. A party line will run to Victoria Square, and phones will be placed at Newton's tannery, Cosgrove's hotel, Albert Williams on the 2nd of Markham, J. Hickson's on the 3rd concession, Hagerman's store at Victoria Square, and a mile north of Victoria Square at Mr. Hunt's residence. There will also be local phones at the Palmer House, W. A. Wright's, L. Innes & Sons, Hill's bakery and at Dr. Langstaff's. Efforts are also made to extend the line to Maple by way of Patterson, and Mr. J. D. Patterson and Mr. Mispolet (Maple creamery) have already given their orders for phones. If a few more phones can be secured at Maple the company will place a free phone at the G.T.R. station. In all probability a branch will soon run to the power house at Bond Lake. The phones are \$20 a unit, and those holding them can talk to any of the places connected with the same central. The poles are being supplied by Mr. Newbury, Elgin Mills.
