RICHMOND HILL, March 30, 1905

Dr. J. O. Orr, manager of the Toronto Industrial Exhibition, has returned from England. While in London he received from Lord Roberts a promise that he would open the Toronto exhibition the coming fall. Next to King Edward himself probably the noted British General is the most popular personage it would be possible to get to open the national exposition.

Rev. G. C. Pidgeon, B.D., of Toronto Junction, has a statement in the last number of the Pioneer, bearing on the results of Local Option in that town. The writer suspects that the law may in some cases be broken secretly, but he feels satisfied that it is better enforced than the license law ever was. The last paragraph in his statement reads as follows:—

"Taken all in all, the law has been a great success. Drunken men no longer lounge around the hotels. Temptation to drink is removed from the young men of the place, and as a residential district its popularity is daily increasing."

At the opening of the Ontario Legislature on Wednesday of last week His Honor the Lieut-Governor read from his speech the following paragraph:—

"Among the Measures to be submitted for your consideration are: a Bill making certain amendments to the Education Act; a Bill relating to the Forest Reserves Act; Bills changing the designation respectively of the Heads of the Crown Lands' Department and the Public Works' Department from Commissioner to Minister; a Bill to create a Department of Mines with a Minister at its head; a Bill relating to the County Councils' Act; and a Bill amending the Ontario Election Act and abolishing the numbering of the ballot."

Judging by an editorial in the Mail and Empire yesterday in all probability the Whitney government will bring in a measure changing the present County Councils' Act so that one or more representatives would be sent to the County Council from every municipality, as they formerly were. A change is certainly desirable as the present law abolished the connection between the village or Township Council and the County Council. The old law was by no means perfect but it can be improved upon by the experience of the past.

### WAIT AND SEE.

Relative to the temperance and liquor vote at the last Provincial election the Christian Guardian in a recent number had the following:

"Unquestionably there is truth in the statement made that Prohibitionists and liquor men walked side by side in the same rank and voted the same way on January 25, and by their action secured, so far as temperance reform is concerned the same result as effectively as if they were sworn and perpetual allies. Ardent prohibition advocates and reckless whiskey tipplers cast the same ballot. The liquor men got what they voted for, sure and easy rum; the Prohibitionists are wondering, amid perplexities, whether they are any nearer to the goal toward which they have struggled for years," etc.

In the same article The Guardian referring to the Whitney Government bearing on the same question says:—"Its policy may be better than its promises, but unless its policy is better than its promises, temperance men will have little countenance or support in legislation for a Parliamentary term at least."

It is only fair for The Guardian and temperance men to wait and see what the new Government will

do. There may be surprises in store for them.

### PREACHERS IN POLITICS.

Clergymen frequently make the statement that they will not be drawn into political discussions unless some moral or religious question is involved. The present discussion over the North West Autonomy bill and Separate Schools seems to provide an excuse for some of the preachers entering the field of politics at the present time. We firmly believe that all schools should be national schools, that all the children in a community should be taught together, and that religious dogma should be eliminated. But we have never heard it charged that Roman Catholic Separate Schools are immoral or irreligious institutions. Why should preachers, therefore, be showing so much feeling at the present time? There is little doubt that in many cases the idea is to embarrass the Government and make political capital.

The Rev. J. E. Starr, in the Toronto News of Tuesday, draws a direful picture of what may happen if the autonomy bill should pass. The well known and popular clergyman prophesies rebellion in this country, and throws the blame on the hierarchy. Listen to what he says:—

"Suppose the people of the new Provinces, so coerced by the passing of those Bills, refuse to respect the law; suppose they resist them as is not unlikely. The Hierarchy, in that case, will have succeeded in placing them in the position of being rebels—actual rebels—and should the Government undertake to enforce the law the advocates of Provincial rights in the rest of the Dominion would be liable to be summoned to arms to shoot them down." Rev. Mr. Starr further says in the same article:—

"Initiate a petition and postcard campaign; and organize a monster deputation from Ontario (ten train loads) to wait on the Government at Ottawa to say that in the event of the Bills being passed a movement will at once be started to secure National Schools over the whole Dominion."

Surely Mr. Starr is not so excited as his utterances would indicate. There is no necessity for talking rebellion. He is talking as a politician and not as a minister of the gospel. And Rev. Mr. Starr is not the only Tory who talks rebellion when his party is out of office.
