The James Bay Railway Company has accepted the debenture issued by the Richmond Hill Council for \$528,75 for the purchase of land for their station near Centre street. Reeve Savage a few days ago received from the company's solicitor a receipt for the debenture which will be paid on or about the 1st of December, when the village taxes are collected.

### EPWORTH LEAGUE.

A profitable hour was spent at Epworth League Monday evening. Miss Alice Campbell presided. After reading of minutes and other routine business, Rev. J. A. Grant, M.A., gave an earnest and interesting address on "Christian Liberty." Said the speaker: "Liberty is freedom to act. Christian liberty dates back to the old testament. Abraham left the land of his fathers rather than submit to idolatrous worship. The children of Israel left their country as there they could not serve God. There can be no true service without freedom, and Christian liberty must have for its basis faith in Christ. We must have law but too much law is apt to make us slaves." Rev. Mr. Grant closed a half hour's address by counselling young men and women to educate themselves so as to be able to take up the work of the older people.
