Council met on Tuesday all the members being present. Reeve Slater in the chair.

Communications were received (1) from D. R. Beating, Clerk of Pickering, asking for statement of items objected to in account that had been presented by Pickering at last meeting of Markham Council; (2) from Ford Braithwaite, Unionville, asking council to remove a threshing machine from roadway which obstructed view from window; (3) from W. A. Littlejohn, Clerk of City of Toronto, asking council to co-operate to secure legislation permitting married women to vote when taxed on the same terms as single women.

Eckardt-Lapp—That this council has no objections to the application of Richmond Hill for permission to close a part of Centre St. within the Township of Markham for the purpose of building a station for the James Bay Railway.


Headford
