We appreciate the news items sent us from time to time by our Mount Pleasant correspondent. We think, however, that when strong criticism is offered against a clergyman or a church, as for instance that in the last paragraph of this issue, it should be done over the signature of the writer. It is not right to hold one person responsible for the opinions of another.

One of the Councillors in the Toronto Junction Town Council opposed a grant of \$200 to the Committee in charge of Athletic sports on the ground that lacrosse matches were properly attended last season owing to the fact that Local Option was in force in that town. The said Councillor's reasoning led him to the conclusion that sports and liquor were kindred, and went hand in hand. It does not speak well for our national game and other kindred sports if whiskey must be included in a programme to draw a crowd.

The Toronto City Council and several other Councils, purpose petitioning the Legislature to put married women in the same position as unmarried women and widows in relation to the municipal franchise. We have never heard any good reason why it should not have been done years ago. Some people go farther and say that women should have votes at parliamentary elections. That is quite a different thing. Suppose a wife go to the poll and cast a vote for the candidate of her choice, and immediately afterwards the husband kills that vote, can the latter expect on his return to receive from his wife a pleasant smile and a tempting dinner? The thing is absurd. Let it alone.

The editor regrets exceedingly to have to cancel the name of an old and honored subscriber and a good citizen, but as it is Mr. Bestard's request we must comply. We have therefore struck his name from our list, and sent him his bill as requested. If THE LIBERAL has "published a slur" about anybody it is also regretted, and if possible we shall make amends. The above letter does not say in what particular article we have transgressed. There is a mistake somewhere, but if Mr. Bestard will point out the article or sentence to which he objects, we believe we can satisfy him that the mistake is not ours. If he does not do this we shall certainly feel that he has done us—and himself—an injustice.

It has been plainly shown, and is not denied, that Mgr. Sbarretti, the papal Delegate from Rome, met Mr. Campbell, a member of the Manitoba Government, by request of the former, and talked over the Manitoba school question and the proposed change of boundaries. It is also stated, and not denied, that Mr. Campbell and his colleague, Mr. Rogers, by request of the Manitoba Government, met Sir Wilfrid Laurier in reference to an extension of the Manitoba boundaries. It is further proved that in the discussion between Mr. Campbell and Mgr. Sbarretti the school question and the

boundary was discussed from a political standpoint. Mr. Rogers' charges by insinuation that Sir Wilfrid Laurier agreed to extend the boundaries if the Manitoba Government would give the Roman Catholics concessions relative to Separate Schools. Both Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Papal Delegate have denied that Canada's Premier ever hinted at such an offer. Judging by the long and honourable career Sir Wilfrid Laurier's reputation for veracity should be second to no person in the Dominion. And yet there are newspapers and public men who say that the charge should be taken as proven.

WEST YORK LICENSE CHANGES.

The West York License Commissioners yesterday refused to renew the license of the Minto House, near the Canada Foundry. The landlord was given three months to dispose of his stock. The North Toronto local option by-law was declared valid and effective after July 10 next. C. Nurse and Kenneth Huff, at Humber Bay, who have each been twice convicted of breaches of the act, were ordered to sell out, while the hotel of James Down was considered a superfluity. The board's intention is to stop entirely the sale of liquor at the Humber.
