### SAD ACCIDENT.

Mr. Geo. Derry received a few days ago from a brother, Mr. H. S. Derry, Colorado Springs, a paper giving an account of the death by accident of the latter's infant son, Stratton LeRoy Derry, aged 14 months. It appears the little boy was placed in the bed by his seventeen-year-old sister, Vivian, for his afternoon nap. He was soon asleep and his sister left him. Two hours later the child's mother went into the bedroom to awaken him and was almost driven insane when she found her baby hanging by his neck from the foot of the bed, dead. Apparently he awoke and started to creep over the foot of the bed, feet first. His legs and body were small enough to slip between the bars but his head caught at the chin and the child was strangled.

Innes-Trench—That the Treasurer pay the above accounts.—Carried.

The Reeve laid before the Council the following documents, viz: The agreement with the James Bay Railway Company, signed and sealed by the Company, together with an acknowledgment of the receipt of the bonus debenture, in accordance with by-law No. 198, also a statement of account from A. G. F. Lawrence, Barrister, for sundry services in the James Bay Railway matter.

Savage-Crosby—That in the opinion of this Council a very large proportion of the benefits of the Metropolitan Railway is lost to this Municipality and surrounding community owing to the terminal being at the City limits, be it therefore resolved that a deputation be sent from this Council to urge on the Railway Company and City Council to make such arrangements as will allow Metropolitan cars to be run to the business portion of the City and lake front, and if the Company and City neglect forthwith to take steps with that end in view, then the deputation to apply to the Provincial Legislature for such legislation as will remedy this very great inconvenience, and that the County Council be requested to co-operate with us in this matter.—Carried.

Crosby-Glass—That the Bell telephone Company be permitted to erect their poles in the streets of this village, subject to the control of this Council. Carried.

The Council adjourned.

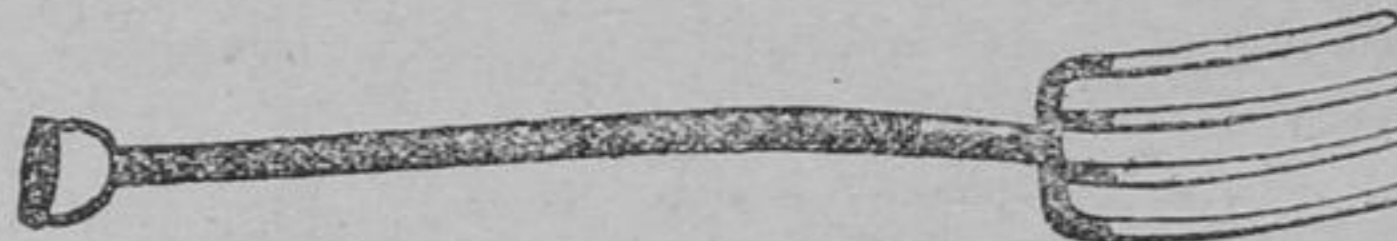
