Cut flowers are shipped regularly from here to New York, Boston, Halifax and Vancouver. Last December a dozen roses were sent to Scotland and out of the dozen eight were perfect on the arrival at their destination. Over one hundred are employed and six thousand tons of coal were stored in the coal house last Autumn.

### BOYS THROWING STONES.

The names of three small boys were handed to us a few days ago, charged with throwing stones at people passing through the streets. ### REFUSED TO RENEW LICENSES.

The East York License Commissioners at their meeting on Saturday refused to reverse their previous decision cancelling at the end of three months the licenses of Mrs. Theresa Wall, Danforth avenue and Mrs. Maxwell of Highland Creek. Messrs. Haverson, Baird and Hazelton appeared on behalf of Mrs. Wall, while Mr. E. Hodgins for the Synod of Toronto, owners of the property, and Ald. Coatsworth of the Municipal Reform League, opposed the license. Charles Crewe, Halfway House and John Rogers, Unionville, were given three months to put their premises in a shape to more fully comply with the law.

### WAITING ROOM AND STATION.

The Metropolitan waiting room and station may now be said to be completed, and it certainly is a credit to the corner on which it stands. The building is boarded with iron shingles, and is neatly painted in two shades of green. The roof shingles are also painted. Inside are a gentlemen's waiting room, a ladies' waiting room, and a freight room at the rear. The ticket office is so arranged that tickets can be sold from wickets facing both the gentlemen's and the ladies' rooms. Outside, a platform is erected on the north, west and south sides, and this is all covered by a veranda which answers as a protection in hot or wet weather. It is to be hoped our citizens will take an interest in protecting the new building, and that boys will not deface or otherwise injure the property in any way. The switch has been altered this week so that by a sharp turn cars will be run close by the south platform where freight will be taken to and from the freight room.

### CHOIR CONCERT.

The entertainment in the Masonic Hall Monday evening under the auspices of the Presbyterian Church Choir was a rare treat. The hall was filled and the large audience thoroughly enjoyed the programme which lasted fully three hours. The platform was tastily decorated with red, yellow and green ribbon over a background of cheesecloth, and looked well. The programme opened with a piano solo by Mr. E. Newton, which was rendered with good effect. During the evening Mrs. Thompson, Toronto, sang several solos in a manner which delighted her hearers, and she cheerfully responded to encores after enthusiastic applause. Mr. Chas. Savage, Toronto, always a favorite in this place, acquitted himself in his best style on the cornet, and it is needless to say he also was forced to respond to encores. The accompaniments were brilliantly played by Mrs. Savage and Mr. Earle Newton. But the unique part of the entertainment was given by Mr. J. W. Bengough, the well-known cartoonist. It is about seventeen years since Mr. Bengough was here before, but his performances on Monday evening showed that he has kept abreast of the times, and his selections were both pleasing and original. As a sketcher with the pencil he is unrivalled, and as a mimic he is without a peer. He probably makes no pretensions as to singing or elocutionary powers, but after his performances of mimicry and extravaganza, it takes considerable nerve for a vocalist or elocutionist to take the platform. He has a versatile

disposition, and his numbers Monday evening pleased the eye as well as the ear. As might be expected Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. J. P. Whitney and other politicians were sketched with the crayon, and two of our prominent citizens were recognized by the audience about as soon as the artist had completed his third or fourth stroke. The first character was the gentleman who recently retired from business here for the very good reason that he had "got enough tin." The other was the historian for "Richmond Hill and vicinity" who had before him a very good picture of York county's only centenarian. In all his characters Mr. Bengough proved himself to be a natural, refined and accomplished artist, and the committee in charge, and especially the choir master, Mr. Earle Newton, are to be congratulated on the success of the whole entertainment.
