### "CENTRAL" AT EVERY POLE.

The Metropolitan Railway Company will install a telephone system in connection with its line, which will give the conductors the opportunity to converse with all points at any part of the system. A portable telephone will be installed in the vestibule of each car. A wire line will be strung along the poles, and when a conductor wishes to communicate with the office he stops the car, plugs the pole and a circuit is made. By this system, whenever a car is stuck in a snowbank the officials will know it at once and be able to send relief.—World.

### SPRING FAIR.

Large posters are out announcing the Annual Spring Fair of the Richmond Hill and Yonge St. Agricultural Society to be held in the Driving Park, Richmond Hill, on Wednesday, the 24th of May. Prizes amounting to nearly \$1,000 will be given for horses, cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, dairy produce, ladies' work, roots, etc. A purse of \$100 will be given for an open trot or pace, and a purse of \$30 for a farmers' trot or pace. A football tournament will commence at 11 a. m. for a purse of \$22.00, and in the afternoon good prizes will be given for footracing and other athletic sports. The committee have been fortunate in securing the Governor General's Body Guard Band, who will render a good programme of music in the afternoon. Arrangements have been made with the Metropolitan Railway Company to give return tickets to Richmond Hill, either from Toronto or Newmarket for 40 cents.

### THE DELINEATOR FOR JUNE.

A striking cover design, a girl's head in pastel, by George Gibbs, introduces the reader of the June Delineator to a varied and interesting table of contents, supplemented by a complete summary of the season's styles. In the literary portion of the magazine, Weymer Jay Mills contributes the first of a series of "Romances of Summer Resorts," which promise much of interest pictorial and otherwise. A noteworthy feature also is F. Berkeley Smith's description of "A Corner in Normandy," an enjoyable travel sketch that gives more than a passing glance at one of the most curious nooks in the old world. Newman's hymn "Lead, Kindly Light," is the subject of a paper by Allan Sutherland in the series "Famous Hymns of the World." In the matter of fiction, Albert Bigelow Paine's serial, "The Lucky Piece" proceeds along pleasing lines, and Helen Choate Prince contributes a short story of great strength and charm. In addition there are house furnishing ideas, and many pages devoted to the particular interests of the home, including, among other features, a paper on "The Practical Side of the Wedding," and a variety of suggestions for kitchen economy.
