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## VICTORIA DAY The Day We Celebrate Fair and Concert a Great Success

Richmond Hill has had many celebrations, but it is safe to say that none were more successful than that of yesterday, when thousands of people found their way to the fair grounds, the attendance probably surpassing all previous records. The day was bright and pleasant and just cool enough to make it enjoyable for the visitors who walked around the grounds or sat upon the green grass. The exhibits in many of the classes were very creditable, and it was generally remarked that seldom are so many good horses brought together at a county fair. The amusements of the day commenced between 11 and 12 o'clock with a football competition in which there were nine entries. The Scarborough Maple Leafs first defeated Locust Hill, next Green River defeated Newmarket, then Parkdale won from Buttonville, and afterwards the Ramblers were beaten by the Heathers. Lloydtown drew the bye and play was continued until finally all the other teams were vanquished by Parkdale, who won the \$22 prize, Lloydtown being the runners-up. The weak part about the afternoon program was the speeding on the track. In the open race only two horses competed, and the farmers' trot was equally disappointing. Everybody was delighted with the quality and quantity of the music furnished by the Governor-General's Body Guard Band, who gave a choice program during the afternoon. The railway traffic was heavy, and the large crowds from north and south were handled in a most satisfactory manner, thanks to the efficient management of the Metropolitan Railway. The concert given in the Agricultural Hall in the evening was enjoyed by the very large crowd that assembled. The performers were H. Ruthven Macdonald, Harry Bennett, Miss Pearl O'Neil and Miss Kitty Lee, with Mrs. Macdonald as piano accompanist. The chair was occupied by Mr. J. H.
