Extracts From an Address.

BY LUTHER B. WISHARD OF CHICAGO.

The following are extracts from an address recently delivered at Newton Brook by the great leader of the People's Hosts in the Forward Move

ment:-Mr. Wishard, whose magnetism it is impossible to put on paper, began by saying that he was not going over the old ground of describing the formation and objects of the Forward Movement. He said that he wanted to inspire his audience, if possible, with the idea that we have not yet gone into the Missionary problem in earnest, only a few of us, only in spots. He said: "We have not even played at it seriously." Here he quoted Gov. Beaver who said: "Youhave not played at Missions yet as boys play at a game; take football, for instance, in going at it in earnest, they go at it as a team. When we go at missions like this there will be something happen."
