SUDDEN DEATH. Mr. James Rumble, for nearly 40 years a highly-respected resident of Patterson, died suddenly Sunday afternoon. He had gone to church with his wife and other members of the family, and during the service felt a choking about the throat. Returning after church he sat in a chair and expired in a few minutes from heart-failure. The funeral took place to the Maple cemetery Tuesday afternoon, and was largely attended. A memorial service was conducted at the house by Rev. Mr. Campbell and Rev. Mr. Chantler. The family have the sympathy of a large circle of friends in the sad and sudden bereavement.

Sherwood Owing to the absence of the pastor, Rev. C. L. Wisswasser, of Zion Evangelical Lutheran church there will be no preaching services on Sunday, June 4. Sunday school in the morning as usual. On June 11 they will hold the holy communion service. Preparatory service the day before at 2 o'clock. After the pastor's return there will be preaching services every Sunday morning at 11 o'clock and every Sunday evening at 7. Sunday school at 10 a. m. Rev. M. Hadwin Fischer, who for several years was a resident of Sherwood, was formally ordained to the Lutheran ministry at Montgomery, Pa., on May 21st by the Susquehanna Synod. He has accepted a call to Grace English Lutheran church in the city of Wilkesbarre and has already entered upon his pastoral duties of that field.

Extracts From an Address. BY LUTHER B. WISHARD OF CHICAGO. The following are extracts from an address recently delivered at Newton Brook by the great leader of the People's Hosts in the Forward Movement: Mr. Wishard, whose magnetism it is impossible to put on paper, began by saying that he was not going over the old ground of describing the formation and objects of the Forward Movement. He said that he wanted to inspire his audience, if possible, with the idea that we have not yet gone into the Missionary problem in earnest, only a few of us, only in spots. He said: "We have not even played at it seriously." Here he quoted Gov. Beaver who said: "You have not played at Missions yet as boys play at a game; take football, for instance, in going at it in earnest, they go at it as a team. When we go at missions like this there will be something happen."

Talking of the great motto of the Young People: the evangelization of this generation, he said going into the work in team fashion we should get our seemingly impossible result without any doubt. He showed what evangelization meant by illustrating the experience of Paul in Asia as described in Acts XIX: 10, and other parts of that book, saying that this was the greatest piece of evangelization on record. In two years every one had not been converted, but had been given the chance of accepting Christ, and thus were evangelized. And this was done with only twelve helpers. This is what we mean by evangelization, that is, giving every one the same chance as we have, of accepting the Christ even if they do not choose to do so. All the favored British and American peoples do not. I want to deal to-night he said, with three great conditions, which must be attended to if we are ever to have the great result we desire: (1), Missionaries; (2), Money; (3), Executive Ability.

(1)—It is a surprising fact that we need only 20,000 for this great work, and should not this be easily attained? With this number we could supply twenty missionaries to every one million of un-reached people. (2)—Then this leads to the money problem. It would require \$24,000,000 a year to support this contingent of Missionaries. This seemingly appalling sum is really an easy one for all the churches of Christendom. It simply means 60 cents a member per year in every church and congregation. An illustration of what can be done when people are consecrated to the cause of Missions, is to be found in the little Moravian denomination: they number only 35,000 members, all told, and yet there are 350 of them missionaries, one for every hundred members; my, what a missionary spirit! They give \$1.00 a month or \$12 a year per head. Now all we are asking our Presbyterian church, said Mr. Wishard, is to give \$1.00 a year, not per month, and your Methodist leaders are only asking you Methodists to average 60 cents per member a year, and then we should easily be able to accomplish our wish. (3)—Then Mr. Wishard dealt with methods. He said the idea of special support was taking hold of the world for practical reasons. He instanced a business man who was speaking to him, who said that this old-fashioned appeal of speaking of the billions of heathen and the glittering generalities so eloquently outlined did not touch him at all. But when you show me, he said, a man in a special field and a block of some perhaps 100,000 or more to be reached then I am ready to see the possibility and as it is a practical scheme I am willing, if need be, to assume the support of such a man myself. This said Mr. Wishard is the attitude I find almost everywhere and we are working along this line and with you we expect to see the fulfillment of our desires.

The teachers of the public school attended the convention at Newmarket last Thursday. Mr. N. Cornell attended the teachers' excursion to Guelph on Friday last. Very many people from here attended the funeral of the late Mr. James Rumble on Tuesday afternoon. Everyone sympathizes with the family in their sudden bereavement.

Buttonville. The death of the late Mrs. John Kelly, which took place at her late residence, near Brown's Corners, 4th con. Markham, on Monday, May 22nd, removes from our midst another old respected citizen of this township. Mrs. Kelly was in her 79th year. She had been in declining health for a number of years and for the last two months had been confined to her bed. Born in the County of Monaghan, Ireland, she came to Markham fifty-nine years ago, married the year following, and has resided continuously in this place ever since. A faithful wife and a loving mother, she was endeared to all by her kindness and lovable disposition. She is survived by a husband and six children—three sons and three daughters. The funeral, which took place on Thursday was largely attended by friends and relatives.

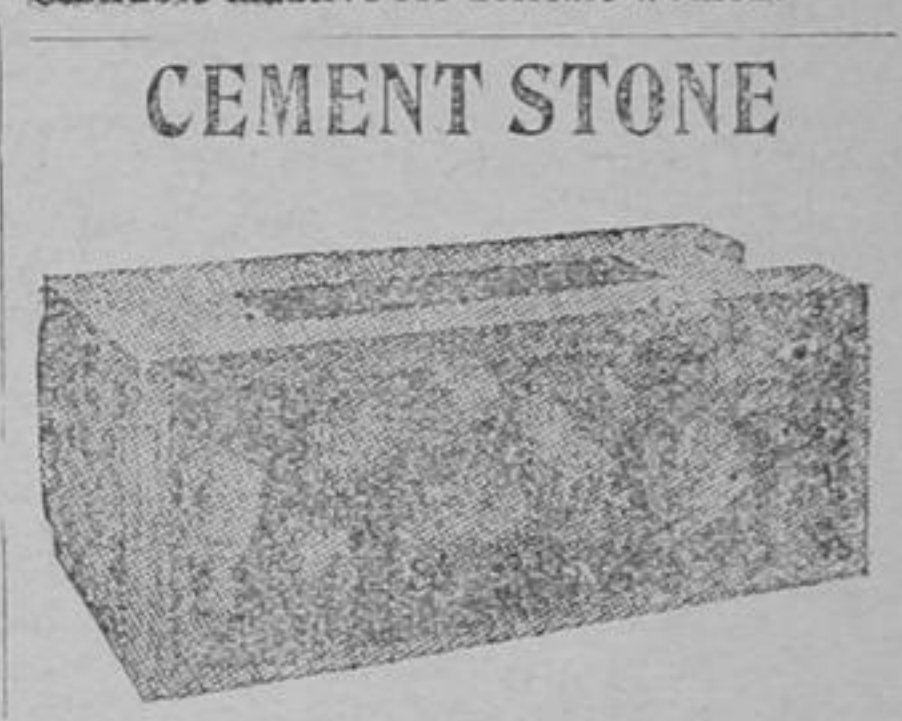
News Notes. T. H. Lloyd of Newmarket, on charges of misappropriating trust funds was committed for trial Monday, but released on bail to await his trial in the fall.
