The World of Tuesday in referring to expressed reasons why the Japs have so completely overpowered the Russians says that while the er may have superior strategy, swifter ships, truer firing and greater daring, these are only the superficial explanations of Admiral Togo's victory. The result of the battle is, in reality, the triumph of sober Japan over whiskey-soaked Russia. It is the greatest temperance lecture ever delivered to the world, to nations and to individuals as well. The statement is made that Russia has learned that she has been weakened by insobriety; that at a terrible cost. The World adds that "Great Britain's greatest danger to-day is the intemperance of the people," and says: "Let Great Britain profit from Russia's lesson before it is too late."

We understand a bill has been introduced in the Dominion Parliament by a member of the Government proposing that betting on race-tracks be made lawful. It is hoped that no such law shall ever be passed. The folly of gambling at the Woodbine during the past two weeks by young and old of both sexes has been demonstrated in scores of cases, and no Government or Parliament should give encouragement to that which is little short of a curse. We see no reason why the best men and women should not enjoy a good, clean horse-race, but the gambling mania should be discouraged whenever an opportunity presents itself. By all means, let the amendment to the law be thrown overboard.

There was a great deal of common sense in Canon Welch's remark in St. James' Cathedral Sunday night regarding the training of children. In a sermon bearing on Paternal Duty and Filial Obedience the speaker said that "one of the grave defects of social life was the prevailing disregard for parental authority. The way in which children are deferred to, coaxed, and bribed by parents instead of being trained to implicit obedience is sickening. Children inherited a certain amount of self-will, which should be controlled by external authority until they were trained to self-control."

Hon. Wm. Macdougall, for many years famous in Canadian politics, died at his home in Ottawa Monday morning. Deceased was 82 years of age and for a number of years past lived in retirement. He was one of the Fathers of Confederation and is only survived by Sir William Howland, Sir Charles Tupper, Sir Hector Langevin and Senator A. A. Macdonald.

All good citizens would like to think that the drink habit is decreasing year by year, but this is not borne out by statistics. The Inspector of Prisons and Reformatories reports that the commitments for drunkenness during the past year were 3,500, an increase of 503.

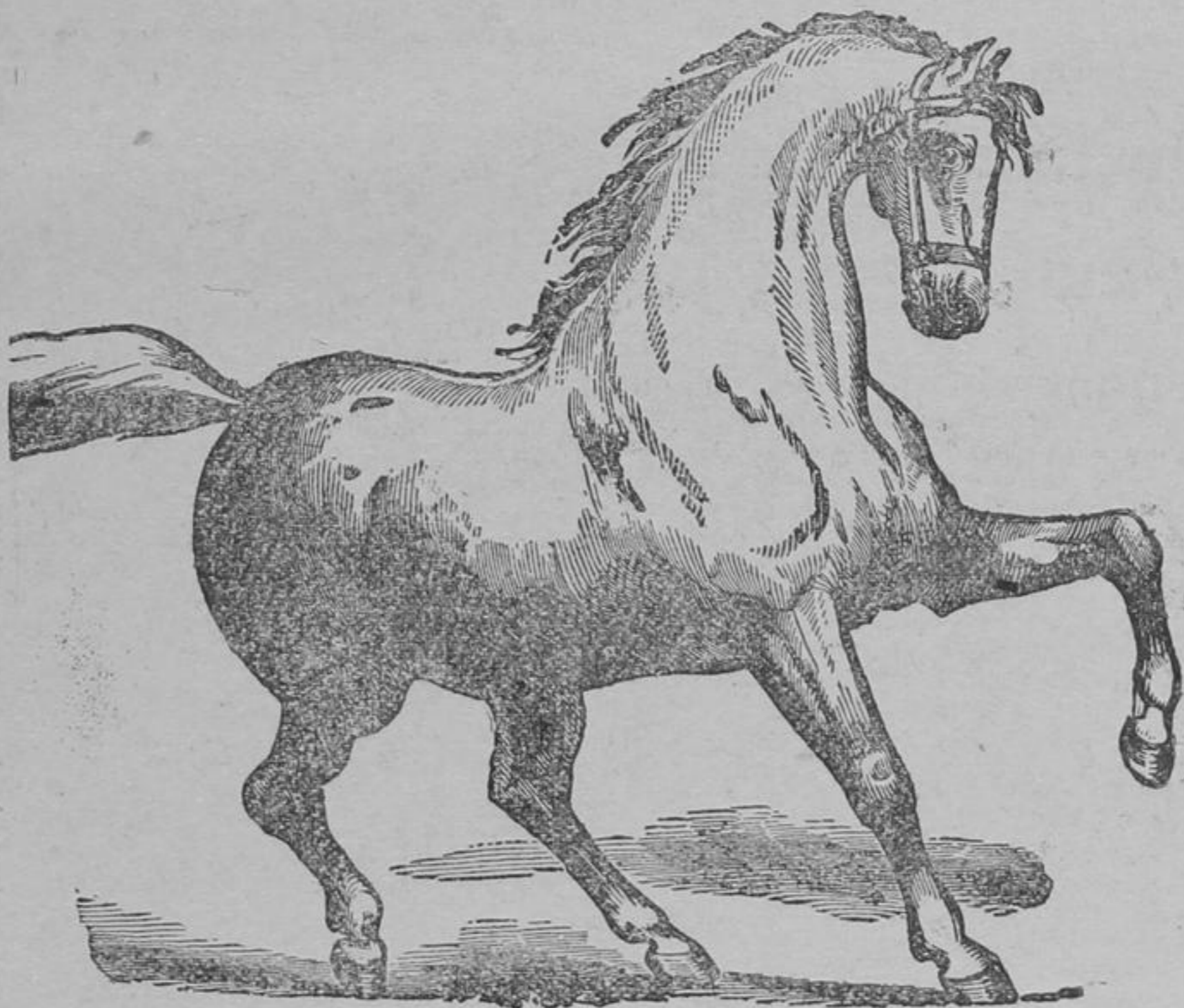
