In the evening a concert was given in the drill shed, Master Frank Klegg, a rising young star vocalist from Toronto, being one of the attractions. A very good day's amusement concluded with a creditable display of fireworks after the concert.

The Council met June 23, 1905. The reeve and councillors Crosby, Glass, Innes and Trench all present. The clerk read the minutes of June 6 which were approved.

The following communications were read: From the chairman of the "select committee on telephone systems," dated Ottawa, June 2, 1905.

From Mr. A. J. Hume, dated 20th June, in which he resigns the office of Village Auditor which is accepted.

The following accounts were read: J. Innes, lumber for sidewalks \$26 46 Ontario Paving Brick Company 19 80 P. G. Savage, account of sundry expenses 5 20 Village treasurer's account, disbursements, postages &c. to June 6, 1905 6 66 Trench—Glass—that the treasurer pay the foregoing accounts.—Carried.

Innes—Glass—that a by-law be passed authorizing the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow three hundred dollars from the Standard Bank to meet the current expenses of this corporation.—Carried.

Mr. Innes introduced By-law No. 199 to authorize the Reeve and Treasurer to borrow the sum of three hundred dollars required to meet the now current expenditure of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill. The By-law was read a first, second and third time and passed.

Glass—Innes—that the treasurer be hereby instructed to pay Mr. Hesse A. Nicholls the sum of \$5 for his extra work under the new Assessment Act.—Carried.

Innes—Glass—that the resignation of M. Teeffy, Esq., as Clerk and Treasurer of the Municipality of Richmond Hill, be and is hereby accepted, the said resignation to take effect at the expiration of the present.—Carried.

Crosby—Trench—that this Council of the Village of Richmond Hill expresses its extreme regret that M. Teeffy, Esq., should, on account of advancing years and the pressure of other duties, feel desirous of being relieved of the heavy work and responsibilities of the offices of Clerk and Treasurer of this Municipality, which offices he has so ably and efficiently filled for over thirty-two years, not only with credit to himself but with the greatest advantage to the Village.—Carried.
