HUNTER OF PARASITES.

His Mission is to Find Natural Cures for Insect Pests.

He had just arrived in London from Brazil, and was off the next day to the Antipodes. I found him in the office of the Agent-General for Western Australia, says a writer in the London Daily Mail. He was carrying a little box containing a few commonplace looking beetles. Yet to find those beetles he had traveled fifteen thousand miles and searched far and wide.

For the bronzed and hardy traveler follows the least known profession on earth, that of the parasite hunter. For years he has been traveling, literally from China to Peru, in his search for insects that will aid the farmer in his war against pests.

"I am a tracker down of the natural cures for the insect pests that are doing damage costing hundreds of millions every year," said Mr. Compere, in answer to my questions. "Every country has its different plagues. How do these pests come? Here London affords you the simplest illustration. Millions of insects are carried into England every day in the merchandise that arrives from abroad, some in the sackings of eastern cargoes, some in the dried foliage around tropical produce.

"At any time one of these strange insects, carried here in such fashion, might find that the English climate suited it, and that one of your native products (possibly wheat) supplied it with a suitable food. If there were nothing to counteract it, it would in a few years spread all over England, breeding in great numbers several times a year. Before many had quite realized what was the matter, your wheat crop would be ruined.

"For some years my work has taken me to every land. Now I am in Spain, now in China, now in the heart of France, now in Central America. My method is this: When seeking an antidote I first find the native home of the pest, I wish to attack. Then I go there, get into the country and examine. I watch the same pest there (where it is probably doing scarcely any damage), and I am almost sure to find that at some stage of its life another insect attacks and destroys it. Then I have found what I wanted—my parasite—and I take it away with me and breed it to fight the pest.

"Every pest has its parasite, and the right way to fight pests is through their parasites. Western

GIRL, CLERKS COLLAPSE.

High Pressure From New Invention Causes Breakdown.

An alarming outbreak of neuritis, amounting almost to an epidemic, has occurred among the women clerks in the telegraph department of the General Post-office, London, England.

The outbreak is due to the large reductions in the staff which have recently taken place, and to the fact that the existing staff of women clerks is terribly overworked.

Miss Mabel Hope, head of the women's branch of the Postal Telegraph Clerk's Association, who herself works in the telegraph department of the General Post-office, declares that a large number of young women were now absent from work owing to nervous breakdown.

"Ever since the introduction of what is known as the inter-communication switch," she said, "the girls have had to work at greater pressure, and cases of nervous breakdown have become much more numerous than was formerly the case.

"The department especially affected is the Metropolitan Gallery. I used to work there myself, and I found that the strain was almost unbearable.

"The girls themselves perhaps are partly to blame, for, while the men clerks will not do more than a certain amount of work, the women are much more industrious, and work at high pressure the whole time.

"The nervous complaint from which so many are suffering principally affects the arms, causing paralysis of the muscles.

"In the case of some of the older women who have broken down in this way, the authorities have acted generously enough, and have enabled them to retire with a pension. I know of a young girl, however, who, the moment her eyesight became affected—which very likely was due to overwork—was discharged. She had only left a short time when she recovered completely, but they have never taken her back."

DIET AND INDIGESTION.

Even very abstemious people are often sufferers from indigestion caused by over-eating. The amount of food they take is not too much for the day, but it is distinctly too much at the time they take it. We will suppose the case of a woman who has had nothing since her light lunch, and who has come home tired and hungry with her day's work to a dinner at seven o'clock. She is thankful for a good meal, eats heartily, and is surprised to find afterwards she feels rather worse than better for it. The reason of this is simple. The Salvation Army is at work in forty-nine countries and colonies, speaks thirty-one languages, has 7,210 corps, "circles," and societies; 13,493 officers and cadets; employs 2,566 persons, and has 45,339 local officers. There are 644 institutions for its social work, and in twelve months the Army supplied 4,573,399 beds and 7,213,506 meals.

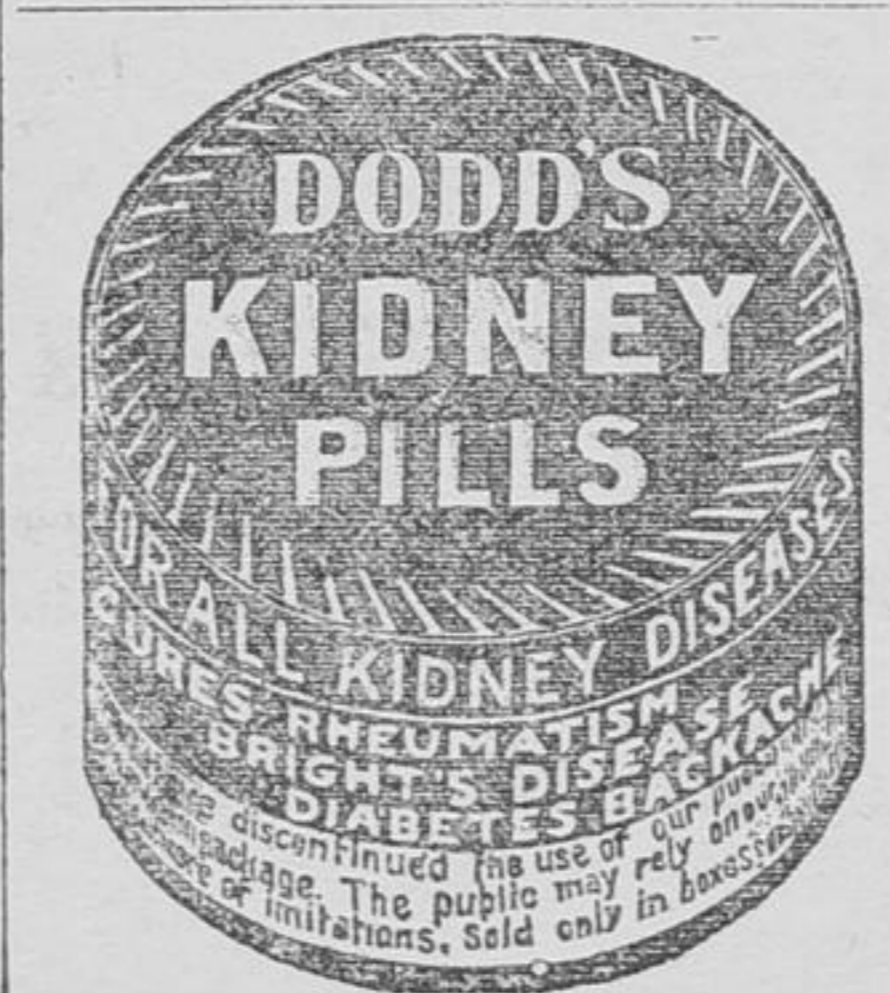

In twelve hours 22,118 people cross Westminster Bridge on foot and 7,051 passengers go over by omnibus. At Blackfriars Bridge 31,385 pedestrians cross in twelve hours and 5,399 passengers in omnibuses. Every day 1,350 electric trams are run to and from Westminster Bridge, and last year a total of 53,000,000 passengers were carried. To Blackfriars Bridge there are 566 cars a day, and the number of passengers last year was 38,000,000.
