## School Meeting.

The Board of Education met Friday. Members present:—J. H. Sanderson, J. Switzer, M. Naughton, G. McDonald, D. Hill, G. Redditt, F. McConaghy. Minutes of last meeting, June 16, read and adopted.

The following accounts were passed:—G. McDonald, putting felt on H. S. erasers, \$1.00; T. F. McMahon, High School supplies, \$10.40; Departmental Exams, \$6.25; Entrance Exams, \$6.35; Public School, \$5.78.

Communications were read from the Principal and second assistant of the High School respectively, each requesting an advance in salary.

Hill—McDonald—That Mr. Shaw's salary be raised \$50, making it \$900.—Carried.

McDonald—Redditt—That Miss Bell's salary be increased \$25, making \$450.—Carried.

McConaghy—McDonald—That this village be assessed for \$300, the same as last year, for the High School.—Carried.

McDonald—Naughton—That the Union School Section be assessed for \$1450, the same as last year, for the Public School.—Carried.

Hill—Switzer—That the Committee of Management be instructed to have the wood work of the H. S. building re-painted.—Carried.

A parent having laid a complaint against one of the H. S. teachers, but giving no particulars, the secretary was instructed to request that said parent formulate charge, when it will be investigated.

The Board adjourned.

## THEY USED KNIVES.

As the result of a carousal in the construction camp on the extension of the Metropolitan Railway on Sunday night, Giuseppe Pacchim, 40 years old, and Fred Feldheim, 33 years old, two Italians, are in the General Hospital, suffering from knife wounds. Both are under arrest at the hospital, charged with wounding. The two men are not seriously injured.

## News Notes.

William Widdifield, son of Mr. J. F. Widdifield of Newmarket, was drowned in the Holland River near Bradford.

Five horses were burned to death and seven large furniture vans were destroyed in a fire which broke out in the stables of the Lester Storage & Cartage Company, Toronto, about 11.30 o'clock Tuesday night.

Major J. M. Walsh, a former commissioner in the Yukon District, and for many years an officer in the North West Mounted Police Force, died at his home in Brockville Tuesday morning. He was 62 years of age.

The Windsor Hotel at Mimico, a brick building, was completely destroyed by fire Sunday morning about 1 o'clock, which is believed to be the work of an incendiary. Five horses and a coach dog were burned to a crisp. Sixteen people were sleeping in the hotel at the time and these narrowly escaped in their night clothes.

## FANCY PRICES TO BOND LAKE.

The Aurora Banner complains—and with some reason—that while the return fare from that town to Newmarket is only 15 cents, the return fare from that town to Bond Lake is 25 cents, the distance being the same in each case, namely 4 miles. We may say that Richmond Hill, which is practically the same distance from Bond Lake, has a similar grievance against the Metropolitan, we having to pay a 25 cent rate any day in the week. Toronto people, 17 miles away, get a 40 cent rate every Wednesday and Saturday afternoon. Our citizens have long been puzzled in an endeavor to discover either the justness or the expediency of giving so great a preference to the city people. If the fare were 15 cents from this place many of our citizens might often be induced to take their families and visiting friends to our nearest pleasure resort, but they feel that 25 cents a head is unreasonable, consequently they seldom go. However, as several necessary improvements have been made by the new management we do not feel inclined to scold. But when they have time to look into the matter the reduction will be appreciated, and we have no doubt it will mean greatly increased patronage to the company.
