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

> Property to the value of \$71.000, including 19 horses, were burned at an early morning fire on the esplanade, Toronto, Saturday morning.

The steamer Argyle, formerly Empresss of India, ran on the rocks at Stony Point near Cshawa and was wrecked. The 150 pass ngers on board were safely transferred to another boat.
